NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN of the availability of registration and voting aids for the election to be held on Tuesday, the 17th day of March, 2020.

REGISTRATION

- 1) In person voter registration is available at the Will County Clerk's Office or with a registrar located at municipal and township offices, as well as other locations in Will County. Voter must be able to provide two forms of identification, one of which must list the voter's current address. The last day to register to vote in person or by mail is Tuesday, February 18, 2020.
- 2) Voter registration is available online by visiting the willcountyclerk.com. The last day to register to vote online is Sunday, March 1, 2020.
- 3) Grace period registration and voting starts Wednesday, February 19, 2020 at the Will County Clerk's Office. Grace period registration allows individuals to register and vote the same day. Voter must be able to provide two forms of identification, one of which must list the voter's current address.
- 4) Register to vote at your Polling Place on Election Day using Same Day Registration. Voter must be able to provide two forms of identification, one of which must list the voter's current address.

VOTING AIDS

- 1) Voters who are permanently disabled have the ability to have a ballot automatically mailed to them for five years, pending the completion of the application and physician's affidavit.
- All active registered voters in Will County can request to vote by mail. Upon receipt of the application, a ballot is mailed to the address provided to be voted on and delivered to the County Clerk's Office on or before Election Day.
- 3) Early Voting allows active Will County registered voters to vote in person before Election Day. The Will County Clerk's Office located at 302 N. Chicago St., Joliet, 60432, starts early voting on Thursday, February 6, 2020. Various other locations throughout Will County open on Monday, March 2, 2020.
- 4) Voters requiring assistance may be helped by a friend, relative or by two Election Judges of opposing parties at an Early Voting location or at the Polling Place on Election Day. Election Judges need to be notified to fill out the required affidavit.
- 5) Temporarily or permanently physically disabled voters can request two Election Judges of opposing parties deliver a ballot to them at the point where they are unable to continue forward motion toward the Polling Place, not exceeding 50 feet of the Polling Place entrance.
- 6) An optical scan ballot-marking AutoMARK voter assist terminal allows voters to mark a ballot privately and independently. It is available at all Early Voting locations and Election Day Polling Places.
- 7) All Early Voting locations and Election Day Polling Places contain a wheelchair-accessible voting booth.
- 8) A magnifying device is located inside each voting booth to view the ballot in larger format.
