Member Harris stated today we will be voting on our FY 2022 Budget. This is a balanced budget that reflects our county's long-standing approach to adopting a fiscally responsible budget, and account for new property growth. Growth for properties that have been developed in the last year as well as the amount of the allowable federal Consumer Price Index. Will County is growing. Over the last four years the county's tax base has increased 4.5%. The equalized assessed value

of Will County properties has increased by one billion dollars since 2020. Individual tax bills may vary depending on how a property's assessed value has changed and depending on the actions of other local government taxing bodies, but the Will County property tax rate will be decreasing under this budget, with the tax rate going from .5986% in 2017 to .5728% in 2021. As stated previously, Will County makes up only 6 .6% of every property tax bill as compared to other taxing bodies. This balanced budget is the result of our County Board, working with our talented team of department staff and other stakeholders, and it is fiscally responsible and also ensures that the county will continue to provide the services that our residents depend upon, particularly as we continue to navigate through the COVID-19 pandemic. This budget includes some funding from the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA), in particular, \$5.7 million for revenue replacement. Looking ahead, the county will continue to use the bulk of ARPA funding to address immediate needs and developing a long-term spending and investment plan to help the county recover from the pandemic and become a stronger county. These funds will enable the county to invest in programs and resources that otherwise might not be sustained in this budget. These funds are in a special fund and the exact distribution and allocation will be decided by this board at a later date. This FY2022 budget, includes quite a few adjustments to Executive Bertino-Tarrant's budget submitted to this County Board. Some of the adjustments includes but is not limited to: \$450,000 to the Child Advocacy Center. Please note that a few years ago, the County Board provided \$0 funding to the Child Advocacy Center. This budget is responsive to this County Board to do more for the Child Advocacy Center. We did not make it to the requested \$500,000 but we didn't quite make it to the amount but we're heading in the right direction. Increase funding for the much-needed Ride-Share Program. Increase funding for the 211 system. 66% of the county budget is spent on public safety, in both the Sheriff's Department and Judicial Operations. Therefore, this budget meets the staffing needs for more sheriff's deputies, court personnel, Assistant State's Attorneys, Public Defenders, Circuit Court and Circuit Clerk clerical staff, court security and deputy coroners. This budget addresses unfunded mandates as additional personal for the State's Attorney's office, i.e., reviewing all camera footage. They are not just responsible for the footage for the Will County deputies, they are responsible for the entire county; every police department, and that puts some additional pressure on them. This is where the biggest increase in personnel is occurring.

Member Cowan stated Assistant State's Attorney Tatroe, could I impose upon you to explain the process of what we are going to be doing here?

Assistant State's Attorney Tatroe state good morning and thank you Speaker Cowan. Just a brief background, and this is probably more for the public that's listening. I think the County Board by and large understands what's going on. As I'm sure everyone knows, every 10 years there is a census. One of the reasons for that census is to track the population so that we can redraw the legislative districts so that there is equal population in each district. That gives the population a one person, one vote balance in the districts. Once those districts are redrawn, the people who live in those districts may very well have a different feeling about who they want to elect. Also, you will have moved representatives to different districts, so the entire County Board, it is the only time in 10 years where the entire County Board is up for re-election. However, the legislature does prefer to have a staggered term, so after the entire County Board is reelected in 2022, we then need to figure out how to get that to a staggered term. The legislature has mandated that there be a lottery, and that the County Board be divided into two or three groups, and those groups be designated how their terms will run. In Will County, we do three groups, and they will be divided up into terms of 4-4-2 years, 4-2-4 years, and 2-4-4 years. That will be done by a lottery, which I believe County Clerk Staley Ferry is going to preside over at this time.

Member Cowan stated I will ask Leader Mueller and Leader Fricilone to make their way to the front of the room. If we can just have someone narrate the process so that folks at home will know what's going on.

County Clerk Staley Ferry stated I will place two bingo balls, number one, and number two into an empty container. A designated representative from the majority political party shall reach into the container and pull one bingo ball.

Member Mueller stated I chose number one.

County Clerk Staley Ferry stated if the majority party representative draws number one, the majority party shall decide whether it wishes to draw slips from the container that contains County Board districts or from the container with staggered terms.

Member Mueller stated I'll take County Board districts.

County Clerk Staley Ferry stated the majority party chooses County Board districts. Now, two individuals, from one of each party, shall inspect and confirm publicly that 11 slips of paper have been prepared in advance by my office in the following fashion. All the districts are here, all the correct staggered terms are here, the three groups, districts one through 11, the terms 4-2-4, four of them, 2-4-4, three of them, and 4-4-2, four of those.

Executive Bertino-Tarrant stated we are going to acknowledge that Member Fricilone and Member Mueller are acknowledging that they are correct.

Member's Mueller and Fricilone stated yes they are correct.

County Clerk Staley Ferry stated we will go ahead and fold these and place them into the containers. Based on the decision made in the bingo ball lottery, Leaders Mueller and Fricilone will take their positions and you'll both be by your respected containers. The party representative who pulls the County Board districts shall read aloud the contents of the slip. The party representative who pulls the terms slip shall read aloud the contents of the slip. They are going to do it simultaneously and we will record these on this piece of paper.

Member's Mueller and Fricilone pulled the following slips:

Member Cowan made a motion, seconded by Member Brooks setting the salary of the Will County Clerk.

Member Newquist stated I'd like to offer an amendment to this. Given that our current countywide salaries are far behind our surrounding counties, I would like to make an amendment to this motion for the year beginning December 1, 2021 and the year beginning December 1, 2022, the salaries shall remain the same at \$93,000. But then I would like to propose a three percent increase for the year beginning December 1, 2023, which would bring the total to \$95,909, and an additional three percent increase for year four, beginning December 1, 2024, which would bring the salary to \$98,787 per year.

Member Newquist made a motion, seconded by Member Mueller to amend the Will County Clerk's salary.

Member Ventura stated as you know I have advocated for an increase, and not just for salaries across the board, but for County Board members as well. In Executive, I had suggested making them proportionate to the County Board, so with that, I would like to make the amendment that no County Board salary shall be less than half of the lowest paid countywide salary and no countywide salary shall make more than four times that of the County Board salary.

Executive Bertino-Tarrant stated we have an amendment out there already.

Member Ventura stated the three percent raise, I will not vote for unless this amendment is included in the amendment that Member Newquist just gave. Her amendment with the caveat of that no County Board salary shall make less than half of the lowest paid countywide salary, and no countywide salary shall make more than four times the County Board salary.

Member Newquist stated you're saying that you would raise the County Board salary to almost \$47,000 per year?

Member Ventura stated yes. You can not make the argument that full-time people deserve an increase at the highest six-figure salary if at the lowest amount you are not willing to do the same. That is increasing a wealth gap and I'm not willing to do that.

Member Newquist stated well I respectfully disagree but that's why we vote.

Member Ventura stated if you want my vote, that's the amendment I propose.

Member Gould stated this is a procedural matter. My understanding is that County Board salaries have already been fixed. That was done. How can you go back and visit something when it's already been done? It would have to be repealed. The motion is not in order.

Executive Bertino-Tarrant stated we are not voting on County Board salaries. Right now the motion that Member Newquist made was for the County Clerk salary. We are not attaching Member Ventura's to this. This is just on the County Clerk.

Member Newquist made a motion, seconded by Member Mueller to amend the Will County County Clerks salary.

Member Fricilone stated how are we voting on keeping a salary when it's already been designated in 2021 what it is? We can't vote on something that already exists.

Assistant State's Attorney Tatroe stated it's to go into effect on December 1, 2021 for fiscal year 2022.

Member Fricilone stated there's no increase in 2022?

Assistant State's Attorney Tatroe stated there's no increase for FY2022, no increase for FY2023, the first increase is for FY2024 at \$95,909 and then for FY2025 at \$98,787.

Member Fricilone stated my question is that means we're voting on a salary for FY2022 even though it's staying the same. We don't vote on a salary for 2022 because it doesn't happen until 2023.

Assistant State's Attorney Tatroe stated you're voting on the salary at what the current rate is.

Member Fricilone stated it doesn't make sense to me that we're voting even to keep it the same for a year that's already been decided.

Assistant State's Attorney Tatroe stated you haven't decided for FY2022. It's as of December 1, 2021. We aren't there yet.

Member Fricilone stated that's my point. The election isn't in 2021, it's in November 2022. So, we can't vote on a salary even if it stays the same.

Assistant State's Attorney Tatroe you are correct. I apologize. You can't change the salary during the term. Member Fricilone is correct.

Member Ventura stated I just want to clarify that the term, the Clerk would get sworn in December 2022. Is that correct?

Assistant State's Attorney Tatroe stated that is correct.

Member Ventura stated so for the 2022 salary wouldn't be for that whole year, it would be for that one month...

Assistant State's Attorney Tatroe stated we need to fix the dates. So we need another amendment to fix the dates. The dates should be beginning December 1, 2022 for FY2023. And then, December 1, 2023 for FY2024. Then, the first increase would go into effect on December 1, 2024 for FY2025, and the second increase would be December 1, 2025 for FY2026.

Member Newquist made a motion to withdraw the motion to Approve as Amended.

Member Newquist made a motion, seconded by Member Mueller to amend the Will County Clerks salary to December 1, 2022 for FY2023, the salary will remain the same at \$93,116. December 1, 2023 for FY2024 the salary will remain the same at \$93,116. December 1, 2024 for FY2025 I'm proposing the salary be

increased by three percent to \$95,909, and for December 1, 2025 for FY2026 the salary to be increased by an additional three percent to \$98,787.

### 4. 21-405 Setting the Salary of the Will County Sheriff - Resolution Added

Member Ventura stated I would like to offer the following amendment. No County Board salary shall make less than half the lowest paid countywide salary, and no countywide salary should make more than four times the County Board salary. With this I will be voting yes, but otherwise I will be voting no.

Executive Bertino-Tarrant stated as discussed you cannot mix the two County Board and countywide.

Member Ventura stated this is not mixing the two. This is adding a requirement that if in the future if we are increasing the salary of the Sheriff, then it would indicate that the County Board salary could not be less than those amounts. So, if in the future you raise the amounts, then this would, in the future, take effect. Right now, they've already been set. For example, the Clerk's amendment was for the beginning of 2025 would have been the first increase. That gives plenty of time for future budgets and the County Board to set that. If it was to take account, this would trigger, and it would have to be added to the budget. So, if the Sheriff wants a raise, then the County Board members need a raise. If we can't value all of our jobs at a decent salary and have qualified people who work hard too, then why are we giving six figure increases, but we can't give small increases? I remember talking on this board that passing a map was all about a salary raise and yet here is your salary raises. We had a revenue neutral increase for County Board members, and we have not kept in pace with inflation. If we value our government, and we don't want a part-time government or a volunteer government, then we need to value the jobs and make space for people to do their jobs. If we want to take a raise for the Sheriff which I think is due, then I think we need to tie that proportionally just like the State's Attorney and the public defenders are today. We need to make that policy change.

Assistant State's Attorney Tatroe stated Member Ventura's motion is out of order. You cannot tie the County Board salary to the Sheriff's salary. They are separate issues. They need to be discussed separately and need to be voted on separately.

Member Freeman stated voting to freeze the salary of the position I currently hold is one thing, voting to freeze other county elected officials' salaries is entirely another thing. All of us were provided the salary comparisons of the three county

elected officials. I studied those comparisons closely and the one that stuck out to me was the Sheriffs. When we compare counties, the greatest salary deficit between Will County and surrounding counties exists in the Sheriff's salary. I did some further digging and what I found prompted me to speak up today. Our Sheriff covers the largest amount of unincorporated area. Our sheriff oversees 650 employees. Of those 650 employees, 400 are sworn personnel. The rest are support staff. It's alarming to learn that there's more than 80 employees in the Sheriff's Department that actually makes more than the Sheriff. According to the comparison charts we received, the last time the Sheriff saw a raise was in 2007. Finally, compared to other counties around us with similar populations, square milage and households, our sheriff earns between \$30,000 and \$60,000 less. This gap exists and left unchecked, it is only going to continue to grow. Therefore, I will be making a motion to amend the Sheriff's salary to include a three percent raise each year for the four years of the next term. December 1, 2022 FY2023; December 1, 2023 FY2024; December 1, 2024 FY2025; December 1, 2025 FY2026.

Member Cowan stated at the end of 2022 the salary would increase to \$114,251, plus the state stipend. December of 2023 \$117,678, plus the state stipend. December 2024 \$127,709, plus the state stipend. December 2025 \$138,040, plus the state stipend. The year four total would be \$144,540.

Member Freeman made a motion, seconded by Member Tyson to amend the Sheriff's salary.

I think we can do this in-house, maybe we bring in a contracted employee, but certainly we can use a consultant. Executive Bertino-Tarrant, as you negotiate this, I really understand that you may be negotiating a menu of services that they'll attach some cost to use those services. I really want to employ, Executive Bertino-Tarrant, during negotiations to really think about if there's more we can do inhouse, and that would be my preference. I would not want to see us spend a lot of money on consultants. I know you'll negotiate on behalf of the county for the county's interests, but I wanted to give you, my view.

Executive Bertino-Tarrant stated so noted. I agree we'd rather have the money in the community than consultants. We're on the same page.

Member Ogalla stated I do support what Member Moustis said. I think we should look at that, and I'm glad we are finally moving forward with this because we have had this money for quite some time now. I am ready for us to have full discussions on what we're actually going to appropriate those dollars for different types of businesses, programs, services, whatever we decide that best fits our needs of our Will County residents. Of course, also remembering that we were able to get that \$5.7 million in revenue loss that other businesses didn't have, so that's a benefit our constituents didn't have so I certainly hope that we plan on things that benefit our residents and our businesses for the future. Member Fritz stated is there anyone present from Animal Control? My question is looking at the job description of the second bullet point says that the officer apprehends, transports, and impounds domestic and wild animals that are stray or injured or diseased. The third ones says investigates animal nuisances reported by members of the public. A couple of years ago there was a period of time of about three or four weeks where there was an injured coyote hanging around my neighborhood, frequenting my yard and my enclosed patio. I called Animal Control and was informed that they don't deal with wild animals. My question is which is it? Do they deal with wild animals or don't they? The other thing I'd like to point out is at that time, I requested from Speaker Cowan that she would have someone from Animal Control come out and give us a presentation of what they do and do not do; what their actual functions include. She seemed agreeable to that, but we have not had that presentation. My question still stands. Do they deal with wild animals or don't they? Why is this in the job description when I was told to basically just (inaudible). I don't have a problem with this officer getting hired, it just grinds my gears that I was treated so poorly by Animal Control, and they apparently have no accountability to us at all. I would renew my call for them to come and give us a presentation and answer these questions. Thank you.

Executive Bertino-Tarrant stated we will make sure that someone from Animal Control reaches out to you directly to answer those questions and answer the role of the job description.

Member Moustis stated having done Animal Control in my township works closely with Animal Control, two things need to be pointed out: Our Animal Control only does unincorporated areas. It's up to municipal authorities to do Animal Control within their corporate boundaries, and quite often they've contacted our Animal Control to do that. There was a time when we did deal with wild animals, but that was many years ago. The job description probably needs to be updated. As far as I know, or at least the last 20 years, we have not done wild animals. We don't have the permits for it, we contract others. We assist with giving them names, but we don't do wildlife. A lot of that is they changed the permitting and they came down on us years ago. You have to meet all types of qualifications, which is very difficult.

Member Weigel stated it might depend on what the animal is. I had a wild bat that died in my driveway and Animal Control came out and picked that up. Maybe it depends on the size of the animal or the nature of the animal.

#### XXIV. COMMENTS BY COUNTY BOARD MEMBERS

Member Ventura stated tonight I would hope that you can enjoy the nearly full lunar eclipse of the fever moon. It starts at midnight. It will be the longest in the century lasting three hours. I would also like to congratulate the men's JJC Cross Country Team. They won in nationals. I don't know if we can do something for them here at the county for them, that would be nice. I would like to wish everybody a happy Thanksgiving.

Member Moustis stated when I looked at the various contracts that we are approving, some of you may not be as obvious because you haven't been here very long. We have a very long relationship with Mac Communications as our public information component of the County Board. I see they're not on here. I understand there's been some discussion that we'll perhaps do something in-house or whatever. I find it disappointing that without any discussion that Mac Communications was just eliminated. I don't favor bringing it in-house. First off, we don't have enough information to put out there if it's like a full-time job. I believe we're better off using consultants for this and have certain expertise and certain access to different media outlets and social media outlets. It seems to me we have an over-abundance of public information people around here, and I don't mean the County Board, I mean the county. I have always advocated that we should have a central-wide public information department for all officeholders, and they feed into that, and they can use some of their own people. I think it's a mistake eliminating Mac Communications. It seems that decision is made by, I'm not sure who, certainly not the Republican Caucus. I understand the majority caucus may want to go in a different direction. Here again, this is to me more of the dismissal of the Republican Caucus and we don't need your input, we'll do what we want to do. Certainly, I think this divides us even more when we go forward in this manner. Everyone have a great Thanksgiving.

Member Pretzel stated I am thrilled to announce that the Lincoln-Way High School marching band will be participating at the Macy's Thanksgiving Parade. As of earlier this week they are the seventh band in the parade. This is a very exciting time for the Lincoln-Way marching band and equally as exciting for the residents of the Lincoln-Way area. Thank you and Happy Thanksgiving, everyone.

Member Coleman stated greetings to everyone. I just wanted to mention that I know we're currently still in what people consider a pandemic and it's been a lot of gloom and doom stories, but there's also been a lot of success. I keep thinking about the funding that we're receiving and so I hope that we use that in an innovative way to push Will

County forward and pivot with the times. Jobs and ways of living are different than pre-COVID times. A lot of people I know who own small businesses actually stated that 2020 and 2021 were some of their best years because they had time to refocus and really drill down on what their purpose was as a business owner. I hope we can share some more successful stories, that we utilize ARPA funds to attract innovative companies to Will County, which I know we have started with Lion Electric being a major one. That makes me think about proactive measures and us pushing into schools, working with the colleges to make sure that they have the appropriate funds for the majors that can keep some of these jobs here in Will County. Are we producing students and college graduates that can work here in Will County, or will they be going somewhere else to find jobs? I would also like to comment about salary increases in general and cost of living increases in general. I went to collage in 1997 and gas was .99 cents. I loved it and I wish it was that right now, but we know 20 years later the cost of living has increased. The people who have been elected in Will County, live in Will County. Their residents have cost of living increases as well. I know we won't be voting on this in quite some time, and I might now even be here in 10 years, but we should consider cost of living increases for the elected officials, just as we do our residents. Finally, I've been holding back on saying this, but this is a very distinguished group, those who sit on the Board, including myself. We are entrepreneurs, some people are retired, if you work somewhere else you have a flexible schedule, that does not speak to the entirety of Will County. We're really trying to move towards being representative of the people. It should be a position that anyone that lives in the county of age can run for the office and still be able to afford to pay their rent and bills etc. Moving forward, a decade from now, I hope there's some differences in who can actually run and sit in these seats besides the people who currently sit here now in our very distinguished positions that we have, and earn, and work for in our lives. Thank you.

Member Balich stated I've been on the Board for a number of years and the first year I got on the Board, I was complaining about not going for a landfill expansion. I thought every year I would keep bringing it up and even this year I thought we're going to do it in the future, but it takes 25 years to get the expansion approved. I don't get it. Why aren't we really making a serious attempt to start to get it? We have to go through the federal government to get all these permits and we're not doing it. We're talking about it like it's going to happen, but it never happens. It hasn't happened since I've been on the Board. Every year they say it's going to happen, it's going to come, but it never comes. I'm just asking that maybe we can make an effort and then next year, that's right around the corner, that we start the process to expand that landfill because it's stupid not to. I think everybody in this room is smart. God bless you guys and have a great Thanksgiving.

Member Ogalla stated I just wanted to mention the fact that tonight, at the Crete Park District, the Will County Department of Transportation is hosting an eastern Will County Freight Mobility study presentation open to the public. The people who attend this meeting can come out and see what's been talked about and what the different quarters might be. They can ask questions and add input if they agree and different alternatives

that will be available to look at. I want to thank Member Weigel, he did come out to the Monee/Manhattan presentation they gave at Green Garden County Club. If any County Board members are able to attend tonight, I think that would be great to see what the issues are in eastern Will County and put some input as well and understand some of the difficulties we're having here with our freight. I just wanted to put that out there and everybody have a Happy Thanksgiving.

Member Mitchell stated I wanted to wish everyone a happy Thanksgiving with your family and friends. As we head into the holidays, I wanted to draw a spotlight on one very important issue that's coming up. That is depression during this time. I want to recognize those who may not have anyone during this time, or feel lonely. Suicide is still a thing. Even within the last couple of weeks, we've had several suicide deaths by some of our youths in Will County and outside of Will County. I just wanted to draw attention to that because it's a very important time. We need to look out for people and check on people. Suicide among youths and overdoses are a crisis, and I just wanted to draw attention to that today.

During this approaching time of Thanksgiving, there are many families who will be struggling, so if we can all keep them in our prayers and keep your eyes and ears open for the community. We will have our beautiful Filipino Advent Mass at St. Mary's Church in Mokena on Tuesday, December 14. It will begin at 7:30 p.m. and if you've never experienced it, it is a very spiritual, very rewarding time of reflection and love of family. So, you are all invited to join us and I hope to see you there at St. Mary on December 14 for our Simbang Gabi mass. Thank you.

Member Freeman stated I would like to add to Member Mitchell and Member Berkowicz' comments and say while the fall and winter holidays are approaching, I encourage each and every one of us to check on our neighbors, offer a ride, take a plate of food, make yourself available and if you are travelling, please drive safely. #### Special Use Permit for a Major Utility, a Solar Farm Facility with Fifteen (15) Conditions

- Upon fourteen (14) days of written notice to the owner of record and/or operator at their last known address, Will County Land Use Department and Will County Sheriff's Department employees are hereby granted the right of entry in and upon the premises for the purpose of inspecting the premises and uses thereon for compliance with the terms and conditions of this special use permit.
- 2. The owner/operator shall retain an agricultural specialist or agricultural consultant to serve as part of the development and/or construction team. The agricultural specialist or agricultural consultant shall be retained prior to submission of the site development and/or building permit application.
- 3. Perennial vegetative ground cover must be maintained or established in all areas containing solar arrays and in required setbacks to prevent erosion and manage run-off in accordance with sections 155-9.245 and 155-12.90 of the Will County Zoning Ordinance.

- 4. The landscape plan shall include ground cover maintenance details including, but not limited to, seeding mix details, reseeding timeline, and weed management practices. The landscape plan shall be submitted at time of the site development and/or building permit application(s) in accordance with sections 155-9.245 and 155-12.90 of the Will County Zoning Ordinance.
- Mowing shall occur five (5) times during the growing season each year on the following schedule: last week of May/1<sup>st</sup> week of June, end of June/start of July, end of July/start of August, end of August/start of September, end of September/start of October.
- 6. The owner/operator of the solar farm shall maintain the areas located within the lease area, not excluding the areas located outside the fence lines.
- 7. The owner and/or operator shall execute an Agricultural Impact Mitigation Agreement (AIMA) with the Illinois Department of Agriculture. The owner and/or operator shall submit a copy of the signed Agricultural Impact Mitigation Agreement (AIMA) at the time of building permit and/or site development permit application. Financial assurance shall be provided to the County in accordance with the AIMA.
- 8. Prior to submission of a site development and/or building permit application by the owner/operator, a pre-construction meeting shall be held. The agencies/individuals invited to attend shall include Will County staff, elected officials, Will County Farm Bureau staff, and other interested parties as determined by Land Use staff and/or the owner/operator.
- 9. On-site power lines and utility connections must be placed underground except where necessary to connect to existing overhead utility lines.

Along the western boundary of the southernmost row of solar panel arrays (as identified on the site plan dated July 3, 2018), a landscaped area at least (10) feet in width with at least one (1) shrub per five (5) linear feet, plus at least one (1) evergreen tree per twenty-five (25) linear feet of perimeter area must be provided. The landscape plan shall include ground cover maintenance details including, but not limited to, seeding mix details, reseeding timeline, and weed management practices. The landscape plan shall be submitted at time of the site development and/or building permit application(s) in accordance with sections 155-9.245 and 155-12.90 of the Will County Zoning Ordinance.
- 4. Outdoor lighting is prohibited except for that which is required by code.
- 5. The owner/operator shall retain an agricultural specialist or agricultural consultant to serve as part of the development and/or construction team. #### Supporting the Repeal of the Federal IMD Medicaid Exclusion

WHEREAS, the Medicaid Institutions for Mental Diseases (IMD) exclusion prohibits the use of federal Medicaid financing for care provided to most patients in mental health and substance use disorder residential treatment facilities larger than 16 beds; and

WHEREAS, the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS) defines an IMD as a hospital, nursing facility, or other institution with more than 16 beds-or more than 50% of the total beds in the facility-that is devoted to the diagnosis, treatment, and care of individuals with a mental illness (developmental disabilities, senility, and neurological disorders are not considered "mental diseases" in this context); and

WHEREAS, the IMD Exclusion discriminates, through fiscal policy, against individuals with a substance use disorder and mental health disorder requiring inpatient care. The law prohibits states from using Medicaid to pay for care provided in "institutions for mental disease" (IMDs), which are psychiatric hospitals or other residential treatment facilities that have more than 16 beds; and

WHEREAS, the Medicaid IMD Exclusion is a barrier to comprehensive evidence-based care for individuals with a mental health and/or a substance use disorder. Health insurance should provide comprehensive mental health and substance use disorder coverage without arbitrary limits on treatment, i.e., paying for treatment delivered in certain inpatient settings, known as "institutions for mental disease; and

WHEREAS, unrestricted federal Medicaid funds for community-based services has not negated the need for IMD-based services; and

WHEREAS, Substance Use Disorders are considered a mental disease; and

WHEREAS, the IMD Exclusion discourages states from investing in inpatient care, hampering access to an evidence based medically necessary form of treatment. Will County has been SEVERELY hurt by the lack of available beds for patients covered by Medicaid or uninsured with a mental health or substance use disorder; and

WHEREAS, there are not enough behavioral health services available in Will County for treatment of substance use; and the IMD Exclusion acts as a barrier in Will County for expansion of substance use treatment providers who accept Medicaid patients to expand beyond the 16-bed limit regardless of high demand; and

WHEREAS, the Will County Director of Substance Use Initiatives has requested that the County support the repeal of the federal law that prohibits IMDs from billing Medicaid for care given to adults between the ages of 21 and 64 at a facility with more than 16 beds; and

WHEREAS, the Legislative & Judicial Committee recommends support of this request.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Will County Board supports the repeal of the IMD Exclusion from the Medicaid legislation.

WHEREAS, the County of Will will join a network of 2-1-1 affiliates in Illinois and the U.S., including surrounding counties, to bring consistent, accurate and timely information and resources to Will County residents; and

WHEREAS, a 2-1-1 system will serve as a vital, trusted community resource, making it easier for people in Will County to connect with a comprehensive array of health and human services that improve their lives; and

WHEREAS, the 2-1-1 system will provide confidential and multilingual services through multiple channels 24 hours a day, 365 days a year; it will respect the abilities, values and or/lifestyles of different multicultural groups; provide professional, high quality and standards-based 2-1-1 services; and

WHEREAS, United Way will partner with others to advocate for the individuals and families of Will County and for new resources and services where current gaps exist and will provide objective data to inform local decision making; and

WHEREAS, the Executive Committee has reviewed this proposal and recommends approval; and

WHEREAS, the Finance Committee has recommended adding \$350,000.00 in the FY2022 budget for the establishment and first year costs of a Will County 2-1-1 system; and

WHEREAS, United Way has requested funding for years two and three which will be determined in future budget cycles; and

WHEREAS, United Way has proposed a future funding plan beginning in year four that includes 51% of the cost of the 2-1-1 system to be paid for by United Way and the remaining 49% to be paid for by other local funding sources that will be determined going forward.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Will County Board approves and supports partnering with the United Way of Will County for the creation of a 2-1-1 system to help residents connect with a comprehensive array of health and human services, 24 hours a day, 365 days a year.

# Proposing the Acceptance and Utilization of up to 5% of the Total Award for Administrative and Planning Costs for HUD HOME Investments Partnerships-American Rescue Plan (HOME-ARP) funds

WHEREAS, the Will County Board enacted prior resolutions agreeing to participate in and administer the Will County CDBG, and HOME programs, and ESG programs in accordance with Federal regulatory requirements, and

WHEREAS, on March 11, 2021, President Biden signed the American Rescue Plan Act or "ARPA" into law, which provides over \$1.9 trillion in relief to address the continued impact of the COVID-19 pandemic on the economy, public health, State and local governments, individuals, and businesses, and appropriated \$5 billion in ARPA funds to be administered through HOME to perform four activities that must primarily benefit qualifying individuals and families who are homeless, at risk of homelessness, or in other vulnerable populations. These activities include: (1) development and support of affordable housing, (2) tenant-based rental assistance (TBRA), (3) provision of supportive services; and (4) acquisition and development of non-congregate shelter units, and

WHEREAS, the HOME-American Rescue Plan or "HOME-ARP" defines qualifying individuals or families as those that are (1) homeless, as defined in section 103(a) of the McKinney-Vento Homeless Assistance Act, as amended (42 U.S.C. 11302(a)) ("McKinney-Vento"); (2) at risk of homelessness, as defined in section 401 of McKinney-Vento; (3) fleeing, or attempting to flee domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault, stalking, or human trafficking; (4) part of other populations where providing supportive services or assistance would prevent a family's homelessness or would serve those with the greatest risk of housing instability; or (5) veterans and families that include a veteran family member that meet the criteria in one of (1)-(4) above, and

WHEREAS, ARPA authorized HUD to allocate HOME-ARP funds to states, units of general local government, insular areas, and consortia of units of general local government that qualified for an allocation of HOME funds in Fiscal Year (FY) 2021, pursuant to section 217 of the Cranston-Gonzalez National Affordable Housing Act of 1990, as amended (42 U.S.C. 12701 et seq.) ("NAHA"), and

WHEREAS, on April 8, 2021, HUD allocated HOME-ARP funds to 651 grantees using the HOME formula established at 24 CFR 92.50 and 92.60, and

WHEREAS, the HOME-ARP allocation amount for Will County is \$4,581,154.00, and

WHEREAS, on September 13, 2021, HUD published a notice titled "Requirements for the Use of Funds in the HOME American Rescue Plan Program ("Notice") which allows the County to receive and use up to 5% (\$229,057.70) of its total award, for administrative and planning

costs, and

WHEREAS, to receive the balance of HOME-ARP funds, the County must engage in consultation and public participation processes and develop a HOME-ARP allocation plan that meets the requirements established in the Notice, and

WHEREAS, the HOME-ARP allocation plan must describe how the County intends to distribute HOME-ARP funds, including how it will use these funds to address the needs of HOME-ARPA qualifying populations, and;

WHEREAS, the HOME-ARP allocation plan will be pursuant to the County's HUD approved Citizen Participation Plan, HUD Regulations at CFR Section 91.505, the Will County CDBG/HOME Advisory Board, and will include the required Public Hearing to discuss the allocation plan for HOME ARP funds prior to submittal to HUD for approval; and

WHEREAS, the Will County Executive Committee has reviewed the HOME-ARP Grant Agreement and places this Resolution before the Will County Board for its approval.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE WILL COUNTY BOARD:

SECTION 1: That the HUD HOME-ARP grant agreement to accept and utilize up to the allowable 5% of its total award (\$229,057.70) for administration and planning, be approved.

SECTION 2: That a special Statement of Conditions, which will be administratively developed prior to final award of any subgrant project, shall become a provision of the local grant award to which each relates, consistent with the requirements of HUD and the County's Policy Manual.

SECTION 3: That the Will County Executive be authorized to execute any and all Grant Agreements with Sub Recipients and or Memoranda of Understandings with agencies or Intergovernmental Agreements with other entities acting on behalf of the County as Project Owner, and all grant agreements with the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) as may be appropriate in connection with the attached amendments.

SECTION 4: That this Resolution and every provision thereof, shall be separable and the invalidity of any portion shall not affect the validity of the remainder.

SECTION 5: That all Resolutions or parts thereof, in conflict herewith, are hereby repealed.

SECTION 6: That this Resolution shall take effect following its passage, approval, adoption, recording, inspection and publication, as may be required by law.



Authorizing the County Executive to Execute an Intergovernmental Agreement with Illinois Housing Development Authority (IHDA) for a Second Coordinated Emergency Rental Assistance Program Based on Federal Funds

WHEREAS, Section 3201(a) of the American Rescue Plan Act of 2021, Pub. L. No. 117-2 (March 11, 2021) (the "ARPA") authorizes the U.S. Department of the Treasury ("Treasury") to make payments to certain eligible grantees within the State of Illinois to be used to provide emergency rental assistance; and

WHEREAS, the Treasury has awarded the County up to sixteen-million, two-hundred-thousand, nine-hundred sixty-eight dollars and ninety cents (\$16,200,968.90) ("ERA2 Funds") to provide Financial Assistance and Housing Stability Services (as such terms are defined in ARPA) to eligible grantees within the County pursuant to ARPA; and

WHEREAS, the County will receive the ERA2 Funds in two tranches, with the County receiving the second tranche following the allocation of the initial tranche of ERA2 Funds to eligible grantees; and

WHEREAS, these ERA2 Funds are in addition to the County's ARPA funds allocation; and

WHEREAS, the Illinois Housing Development Authority ("IHDA") has previously successfully assisted the County in implementing an Emergency Rental Assistance Program; and

WHEREAS, the Illinois Intergovernmental Cooperation Act (5 ILCS 220/1 et seq) authorizes counties to exercise jointly with any public agency of the State, any power, privilege or authority which may be exercised by a unit of local government individually, and to enter into contracts for the performance of governmental services, activities, and undertakings; and

WHEREAS, in an effort to efficiently meet the needs of its residents and to avoid the duplication of efforts, the County desires to enter into an intergovernmental agreement with IHDA to coordinate the distribution of the County's ERA2 Funds as part of an ERA2 Program.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Will County Board hereby authorizes the Will County Executive to execute an intergovernmental agreement with IHDA, in substantially the same form as attached hereto, to coordinate an ERA2 Program to allocate the ERA2 Funds to eligible grantees.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that said agreement is subject to review and approval of the Will County State's Attorney's Office.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Will County Board hereby authorizes the Will County Executive to take all actions necessary to implement the ERA2 Program and to execute any

#### EMERGENCY TELEPHONE SYSTEM ACT (50 ILCS 750) WILL COUNTY BOARD RESOLUTIONS (89-193, 89-213, 90-11, 96-135, 02-82, 07-415, 10-96)

ETSB By-Laws / ARTICLE I. Purpose.
Sec. A. The Will County Emergency Telephone System Board (hereinafter referred to as the "ETSB") is established pursuant to Chapter 50, Illinois Compiled Statutes, Act 750, for the purposes set forth in 50 ILCS 750/1 and 50 ILCS 751/5 and pursuant to Resolutions 89-193 and 89-213 of the Will County Board, adopted August 17, 1989, Resolution 90-11 of the Will County Board adopted January 18, 1990, Resolution 96-135 adopted June 20, 1996, Resolution 02-82 adopted February 21, 2002, and Resolution 07-415 adopted November 6, 2007 and Resolution 10- 96 adopted March 18, 2010, such resolutions sometimes being collectively referred to as the "Resolutions".

#### MEMBERS & TERM LENGTH:

ETSB By-Laws / ARTICLE III. Membership.

Sec. A. Subject to Section C below, the Membership on the ETSB shall consist of members appointed to represent the following:

 One Member from the Will County Board
 One member from the Will County Executive Office
 One member from the Will County Emergency Management Agency
 The Will County ICT Department Director, who shall serve as the Chair of the ETSB Technology Advisory Committee

(5) One Citizen at Large, who lives in the area served by the Will County ETSB
(6) One member from each of the Will County Emergency Telephone System 9-1-1 PSAP Centers

(7) Two (2) Members from the County Wide Fire Services (8) Two (2) Members from the County Wide Law Enforcement Services

The names of all appointments will be submitted to the Will County Executive for approval. Members shall be appointed by the Will County Executive with the advice and consent of the Will County Board.

Sec. B. Fire and Law Enforcement Service members' appointments shall be made by a recommendation to the Will County Executive from each of their respective groups: the Will County Fire Chiefs Association and the Police Chiefs Association of Will County.

Sec. C. Each PSAP will have an appointment to the ETSB as follows: each PSAP will be represented on the ETSB by the individual PSAP Director or his/her designee. In the event that any member PSAP dissolves or merges with another member PSAP, the size of the ETSB shall decrease by one number effective upon receipt of written notice by the Chief Administrator of the ETSB of such dissolution or merger.

ARTICLE IV. Organization and Terms of Office.

Sec. A. The term of office shall be three years. Each term of office shall begin on February 1st for the term for which such Member is appointed and shall terminate on January 31, at the conclusion of such Member's term; provided that such Member may remain in office until such time as his or her successor has been duly appointed and qualified.

ETSB By-Laws / ARTICLE IV. Organization and Terms of Office.

Sec. B. A vacancy on the ETSB may be occasioned by resignation or death. The County Executive shall appoint a person to fill the unexpired term created by such vacancy according to the requirements set forth in Will County Board Resolution No. 07-415 and Resolution No. 10-96.

Sec. C. In appointing a person to fill a position created by a vacancy, the person appointed to complete such term shall have his/her term terminate on the same date as that of the vacating person as if such appointee were selected for the original appointment.

(4) Authorizing all disbursements from the fund.(5) Hiring any staff necessary for the implementation or upgrade of the system.





#### MEMBERS & TERM LENGTH:

Sec. 4.01. Five-member boards.

a) Any appointed board of trustees of a fire protection district may provide for the establishment of a 5member board of trustees by adopting an ordinance to that effect. An appointed board of trustees shall also be increased to a 5-member board upon the adoption of a proposition to increase the board as provided in subsection (b) of this Section. When such an ordinance or proposition has been adopted, the appropriate appointing authority shall, within 60 days of the date of the adoption of the ordinance or proposition, appoint 2 additional trustees to the board of trustees, one to hold office for 2 years and one to hold office for 3 years from the first Monday of May next after their appointment and until their successors are appointed and have qualified. The lengths of the terms of these 2 additional members shall be determined by lot at the first meeting of the board of trustees held after the 2 additional members take office. The 3 trustees already holding office in the district shall continue to hold office for the remainder of their respective terms. Thereafter, on or before the second Monday in April of each year the appropriate appointing authority shall

appoint one trustee or 2 trustees, as shall be necessary to maintain a 5-member board of trustees, whose terms shall be for 3 years commencing the first Monday in May of the year in which they are respectively appointed.



In addition, fire districts that operate an ambulance service pursuant to authorization by referendum, as provided in Section 22, may pay trustees an additional annual compensation not to exceed 50% of the amount otherwise authorized herein. The additional compensation shall be an administrative expense of the ambulance service and shall be paid from revenues raised by the ambulance tax levy. In addition, any trustee of a fire protection district who completes a training program on fire protection district administration approved by the Office of the State Fire Marshal may receive additional compensation above the compensation otherwise provided in this Section. The additional compensation shall be equal to 50% of such other compensation. In order to continue to receive the additional compensation, the trustee must attend annual training approved by the Office of the State Fire Marshal on a continuing basis thereafter.





Sec. 4 [...]the appropriate appointing authority shall appoint 3 commissioners for such district, one of whom shall hold office for a term expiring on the first Tuesday of September next, one of whom shall hold office for a term expiring on the first Tuesday of the second succeeding September, and the other of whom shall hold office for a term expiring on the first Tuesday of the third succeeding September, and until their respective successors are selected and have qualified.


Sec. 4-10. Filling vacancies in appointive commissioners-Removal from office. If, for any reason, a vacancy occurs in the office of commissioner in a district in which the commissioners are appointed the appointing authority may appoint a office of commissioner in a district in which the commissioners are appointed the appointing authority may appoint a successor, either without notice or upon such notice as the appointing authority may direct, to fill the vacancy until the first Tuesday of September next, on which date, or as soon thereafter as may be feasible, the appropriate appointing authority shall appoint a successor for the remainder of the term, in accordance with Sections 3-9, 4-1 and 4-2. For good cause shown any commissioner, whether elected or appointed, may be removed from office by the appointing authority upon its own motion or upon the motion of any interested landowner. Notice to such commissioner of the hearing on such motion shall be given as the appointing authority shall direct.

COMPENSATION:

Sec. 4-13, Pay of commissioners, Each commissioner shall receive for his services a sum not to exceed \$30 per day for each day he is actually engaged in the business of his office, and he shall be reimbursed for his necessary traveling and other expenses incurred in the performance of his duties. Each commissioner shall present to the court an itemized account, under oath, of his claim for services and expenses, which shall be audited by the court and certified by it to the treasurer of the district for payment.


Sec. 4-38. District treasurer; collector. [...]
(e) A copy of the resolution of the commissioners appointing a treasurer and fixing his compensation shall be filed with the clerk who shall record the same in the drainage record and another copy shall be left on file in the office of the County Collector of the county or counties in which the lands of the district are situated.

Sec. 4-3. Qualifications of Commissioners. No person shall be appointed or elected commissioner of a district who is not an adult resident of Illinois. Neither shall any person be appointed or elected commissioner of a district who does not own land in the district unless (a) the court in election districts or the appointing authority in other districts finds it to be in the best interests of the district that the requirement of ownership of land in the district be waived or (b) the selection of commissioners is by appointment and a majority of the adult landowners owning a majority of the area embraced in the district have duly petitioned the appropriate appointing authority to allow the appointment as commissioner of an individual who does not own land in the district.

#### SANITARY DISTRICT ACT OF 1936 (70 ILCS 2805)

PURPOSE:

Sec. 6.2. The sanitary district, in addition to other powers vested in it, is authorized to enter into agreements with any city, village or incorporated town located partly within and partly without the territorial limits of the sanitary district and which has a sewage system to receive and dispose of all sewage of such city, village or incorporated town collected by its system; and for such purpose the sanitary district may extend its drains, ditches or sewers to connect with the sewage system of such city, village or incorporated town.

Sec. 7. The board of trustees of any sanitary district organized under this Act shall have power to provide for the collection and disposal of the sewage thereof and the drainage of such district and to save and preserve the water supplied to the inhabitants of such district from contamination. For that purpose they may construct and maintain an enclosed conduit or conduits, main pipe or pipes, wholly or partially submerged, buried or otherwise, and by means of pumps or otherwise, cause such sewage to flow or to be forced through such conduit or conduits, pipe or pipes to and into any ditch or canal constructed and operated by any other sanitary district, city, village, county, public utility or incorporated town, after having first acquired the right so to do. Such board of trustees may co-operate with and enter into contracts with any other sanitary district, city, village, county, public utility or incorporated town for the collection and disposal in whole or in part of the sewage and drainage (or either thereof) of such sanitary district, city, village, county, public utility or incorporated town for the joint collection and disposal of the sewage and drainage of such contracting parties. Such board of trustees may provide for the collection and disposal of sewage and the drainage of such district by laying out, establishing, constructing and maintaining one or more channels, drains, ditches and outlets, for carrying off and disposing of the sewage and drainage of such district together with such adjuncts and additions thereto as may be necessary or proper to cause such channels or outlets to accomplish the end for which they are designed, in a satisfactory manner, including pumps and pumping stations and the operation of the same. Such board of trustees may also treat and purify such sewage so that when the same shall flow into any lake, river or other water course, it will not injuriously contaminate the waters thereof, and may adopt any other feasible method to accomplish the object for which such sanita

Sec. 8. Every such sanitary district shall proceed as rapidly as is reasonably possible, by construction, purchase, lease or otherwise, to provide sewers and a plant or plants for the treatment and purification of its sewage, which plant or plants shall be of suitable kind and sufficient capacity to properly treat and purify such sewage so as to conduce to the preservation of the public health, comfort and convenience and to render said sewage harmless, in so far as is reasonably possible to animal, fish and plant life. Any violation of this proviso and any failure to observe and follow same, by any sanitary district organized under this Act, shall be held, and is hereby declared, to be a petty offense on the part of said sanitary district and the trustees thereof may be ousted from office as trustees of said district by an order of the court before whom the cause is heard. It shall be the duty of the Department of Public Health of the State to cause the foregoing provisions to be enforced; and upon the complaint of said Department of Public Health it shall be the duty of the Attorney General or State's Attorney of the County in which such violation may occur, to institute and prosecute such cause by indictment or information in the manner provided by law.

MEMBERS & TERM LENGTH:

Sec. 3. (a) A board of trustees, consisting of 3 members, for the government, control and management of the affairs and business of each sanitary district organized under this Act shall be created by appointment as provided in paragraph (b)

of this Section or by election as provided in Sections 3.1 and 3.2.


(b) Within 60 days after the organization of a sanitary district, the presiding officer of the county board with the advice and consent of the county board shall appoint 3 trustees, all of whom shall be residents of such sanitary district, who shall hold their offices respectively, from the date of their appointment to the first Monday of the June of the first, second and third calendar years, respectively, next after their appointment and until their successors are elected and qualified. Thereafter, on or before the second Monday in May of each year the appointing authority in the county in which such sanitary district is situated shall appoint one trustee whose term shall be for 3 years commencing the first Monday in June of the year in which he is appointed. The respective terms of the first trustees shall be determined by lot at their first monday in This paragraph does not apply in a capitary district which has determined under Sections 3.1 and 3.2 to elect its meeting. This paragraph does not apply in a sanitary district which has determined under Sections 3.1 and 3.2 to elect its

VACANCY:

(e) Whenever a vacancy in an appointive board of trustees occurs either from death, resignation, refusal to qualify, or for any other reason, the appointing authority in the county in which such sanitary district is situated may fill such vacancy by appointment. [...] Any person appointed to fill a vacancy on a board of trustees, whether appointive or elected, shall qualify for office in the manner stated in this Section and shall thereupon assume the duties of the office for the unexpired term to which he was appointed.

COMPENSATION:

Sec. 4. The trustees shall constitute a board of trustees for the sanitary district. [...] The board of trustees at the beginning of each new term of office shall meet and elect one of their number as president, one of their number as vice-president, and from or outside of their membership a clerk and an assistant clerk. [...] The board may select a treasurer, engineer and attorney for the district, who shall hold their respective offices during the pleasure of the board, and give such bond as may be required by the board. The board may appoint such other officers and hire such employees to manage and control the operations of the district as it deems necessary. The board may prescribe the duties and fix the compensation of all the officers and employees of the sanitary district. However, no member of the board of trustees shall receive more than \$6,000 per year.

#### CEMETERY ASSOCIATION ACT (805 ILCS 320)

MEMBERS & TERM LENGTH:

Sec. 4. That said persons so receiving said certificate of organization of said association shall proceed to elect from their own number a board of trustees for said association, which said board shall consist of not less than six (6) nor more than ten (10) members, as said persons so receiving said certificate may determine; that said trustees when elected shall immediately organize by electing from their own membership a president, vice president and treasurer, and shall also elect a secretary, who may or may not be a member of said board of trustees, in their discretion, which said officers shall hold their respective offices for and during the period of one (1) year, and until their successors are duly elected and qualified. Said trustees when so elected shall divide themselves by lot into two classes, the first of which shall hold their offices for and during the period of three (3) years, and the second of which shall hold their offices for and during the period of six (6) years, and that thereafter the term of office of said trustees shall be six (6) years [...]

Sec. 4. [...]upon the expiration of the term of office of any of said trustees, or in case of the resignation or death or removal from the State of Illinois of any of said trustees, or their removal from office as provided in this act, the remaining trustees, or a majority of them, shall notify the presiding officer of the County Board in which said cemetery is situated, of such vacancy or vacancies in writing and thereupon said presiding officer shall appoint some suitable person or persons to fill such vacancy or vacancies; and that thereafter the presiding officer of the county board in which said cemetery association is located shall always appoint some suitable person or persons interested in said cemetery association through family interments or who are citizens of the State of Illinois.

Sec. 8. No officer or trustee of said Cemetery Association shall receive any compensation of any kind for any services rendered by him in behalf of said association, except the secretary of said association, who may receive such salary as may be fixed by the Board of Trustees.
