1. PACE Presentation of FY22 Budget

The PACE presentation is on file in the County Clerk's Office.

Mr. Rick Kwasnewski stated are there any questions or comments?

Member Moustis stated Frankfort Township, where I am the Supervisor, has had a partnership with PACE almost since the creation of PACE. It's something that I have personally always believed in. We also partnered with Will Ride which is another, fairly new, system that the county is sponsoring and it makes a really big difference in our overall level to give our residents additional service. I am hoping that we can continue to get support fromPACE. There's a couple of other questions I have. "Ride the Shoulder" seems to be really successful, haven't heard much about it lately. Is PACE still looking at the expansion of that?

Mr. Rick Kwasnewski stated our ridership went down on those rides to about 25% of what our ridership was. It's a commuter service for the most part. That was kind of expected...similar to what METRA experienced. We are probably in the mid-40's right now, so it's coming back as people are coming back to work. During that time, we were continuing to look to see if there were opportunities for expansion of that service. Perhaps along 355 to be able to access 55 and back into the city, and also look at improvements similar to the Plainfield Park & Ride facility, which is really a great facility. It was about a six-million-dollar investment, so we're looking at opportunities over the next few years as ridership comes back to be able to expand routes and make those station improvements to make it comfortable for riders. It is a challenge. It is probably our biggest challenge because when you look at the rest of our fixed route service, that has come back a

lot quicker. Some routes they shaved off a little bit of ridership, but it wasn't a great deal. It depends on the route, who's riding it going forward, and some of the areas in Cook County we hardly took a dip in ridership and in other areas it was very dramatic. The good news is, it is coming back, and as I said, we're down about 35% now but it's a lot better than when we were at 70%.

Member Moustis stated the challenge for counties is how do you get from the east side of Will County to the west side of Will County; or north/south. There tends not to be any main-line routes...there's not a bus that goes on Route 30, for example. Does it make sense to have any main-line services? A lot of it is the roadways because they don't go all the way through.

Mr. Rick Kwasnewski stated some of the aspects could be addressed in Will Ride with some innovative-type services that we've been talking about. Some of it could be addressed more geographically like an on-demand service as well that could be a shuttle that continues to go around. The problem we've got with fixedroute services is two things. One, it's very expensive and it's really not as convenient as you think for people. What we've learned throughout the region is people are looking to get from point A to point B on their schedule. Not necessarily on PACE's schedule. What we've really tried to look at is partnerships with Uber and Lift and the taxi access program and in some cases, the on-demand services, because they're much more convenient. That way, you could pick up the phone and say, hey, I'd like to have a ride in 20 minutes versus having to wait. We're going to continue to look at our fixed route and make modifications and improvements but believe me we're trying to do some innovative things, so we're certainly willing to entertain those things. I know Mr. Rocky Donahue and his staff are willing to address those.

Member Moustis stated I will say that Lift and Uber and taxi services is the way to go.

Mr. Rick Kwasnewski stated transit agencies across the country have started to do a lot of those, that's why we're excited to do some of those micro-transit options for people. We'll see how it goes and then maybe roll it out on a wider basis as well.

Member Fricilone stated you're talking about "Ride the Shoulder" and the commuter service as the workers come back, and I'm sure you're doing your projections as the workers come back but how are you factoring in remote workers into that projection? Everything that we're seeing is moving that way.

Mr. Rick Kwasnewski stated I know one of the things we may have to do if ridership doesn't come back is reduce the number of times for the routes going in and out.

Mr. Rocky Donahue stated we've been working the past year with a lot of businesses in the city of Chicago, ourselves, METRA and CTA and it is going to be a challenge. What most companies are telling us is that telecommuting is going to be part of their future; that the workforce may come back one day a week or two days a week. That means we're going to have to adjust our schedule. There will always be riders, but as Member Fricilone said it may mean we do less trips, we won't need as many busses, but we view that as opportunities to look at service differently off-peak times now instead of traditional a.m. and p.m. rush hour will maybe be beefing up local service in non-peak times for those residents who are now telecommuting but maybe at lunchtime they want to a local restaurant or go pick up a sandwich. We have to change the way we're looking at things and we'll be doing market studies to be looking specifically at that. We're concerned that the workforce is not going to be as healthy as it was pre-pandemic.

Member Berkowicz stated I have a question regarding of the subsidy for the transportation in the network company. What I'm wondering is you'll be subsidizing that program and how will you be regulating or monitoring it? The money you give PACE subsidizes to Uber or Lift or any other ride program. How will you be regulating or monitoring it to ensure that it's cost effective and reaching the targeted population? Is there a specific population you're trying to reach?

Mr. Rocky Donahue stated I'm going to use our example of what we're modeling a lot of it after. What we do currently in the city of Chicago, what we call our Taxi Access program. The difference is our Taxi Access program is only for individuals who have disabilities and are ADA Certified, so it's not open to the general public. In that case, they are able to get a \$30.00 cab ride and they pay a \$3.00 fare. They pay the \$3.00 fare, and we pay the other \$27.00. Is that cost effective, sounds kind of high? To do the service on the smaller paratransit bus costs \$50.00. So, It's actually \$20.00 less than using the equipment and it provides a lot more freedom and ability to go when they want to the rider. The idea would be similar in the area, but it wouldn't be as high of a subsidy. It would probably be closer to you'll get at \$10.00 Uber ride if you pay the bus fare of \$2.00, so our subsidy would be that \$8.00. It would be set up to serve various areas. It wouldn't be designed just for people with disabilities or for people to get to work, it would be open to the general public. That's how it would be set up. How do we do that? We work with those ride share companies. The individual would have to have an account with the rideshare company. You would pay the \$2.00 fare and if you drove within the geographical boundary we would subsidize up to that number probably close to \$10.00. Does this answer your question?

Member Berkowicz stated it does, but it raises concerns because I don't know how you can afford to do that. If you're looking at an urban population and I'm a young adult and I know that I can have this very convenient program, I would use it all the time. So, if it's being subsidized, I don't know how you can sustain that. I think the cost is pretty high.

Mr. Rick Kwasnewski stated one example is a test pilot I think we're going to try is in Naperville where in the past we were providing bus service to and from points in Naperville to the train station. Fifteen years ago METRA used to fund it, and then METRA walked away from it and we continued to fund it. Things slowed down on METRA so we scaled back the service, but now we know we need to figure out how we're going to be able to ramp that up and I think that's one of the test programs that we're going to work on. Whereas Rocky said, you would have to be in that geographical area that it would trigger. I think there's some technology out there. Obviously, Uber has to be out there to be able to track that as well. That's a dramatically lower cost overall, than us running a fixed route bus from point A to point B from the outside outskirts of Naperville to take them to the train station. In some cases, it's cost savings. I think it's all about the geographical area and the times and ability to be able to use those.

Mr. Rocky Donahue stated an overall public transit is subsidized by tax dollars. We collect from PACE about 30% of our cost from the farebox so passengers are paying about 30% of the cost and sales tax pays the other 70%. So, I think to your point, are we better off spending \$100,000 on a bus route that maybe carries 30 people all day long or are we better off subsidizing \$100,000 on Uber and Lift trips where 200 people take it. The subsidy is still going to be there because public transit is subsidized by tax dollars, it doesn't make money. It's how do we provide more trips per individual with the amount money we have.

Member Berkowicz stated one more question. How will that type of a pilot program impact sales tax revenue? If we have commuters now that use our public transit and they do pay sales tax, how...

Mr. Rick Kwasnewski stated what Rocky is saying is we get regionally, like you guys do, we get sales tax that funds all of our transit operations. They will still pay a fee; they don't pay any tax. The taxes are when they're generated at the retail level throughout the region. So, when he talks about, we're subsidized by sales taxes, not by the individual, it's by the region. I think one of the things we found too is, throughout the region, what happens in Will County doesn't work in Cook and doesn't work in Lake. What we're really trying to do is find out where these little pockets could work and maybe do on-demand service. Some fixed route, some Uber and Lift, and get the most ridership we can, and get the benefit for all of your constituents and our riders.

Mr. Roger Claar stated I would just like to reiterate what Mr. Rick Kwasnewski said earlier about the Executive Director announcing his retirement yesterday. Mr. Rocky Donahue has been at PACE for 40 years. I think he's done an outstanding job. I've been around for a long time and a lot of executives at PACE come and go. The one common denominator throughout his success that has grown this great agency is Mr. Rocky Donahue. Rocky, thank you for your service.

Member Mitchell stated if you were anticipating a change in your commuter habits, such as more at-home working and that sort of thing, how is that going to affect your rolling stock. For instance, will you be purchasing more, or perhaps smaller vehicles.

Mr. Rick Kwasnewski stated in general, a great deal of our riders throughout the region, they don't have a vehicle, so they rely on PACE. Our rolling stock, our fixed route busses, are going to be converted to zero emission at some point. We are converting the CNG in some areas and we're going to convert eventually to electric busses or some technology we don't know about. We are going to continue to monitor that and to do that, but what we may end up doing is on certain routes we may end up doing smaller busses. We may end up looking at the more on-demand service that we talked about which are the smaller paratransit busses that the townships have and provide different types of rides there. We do have a van pool program currently that people can pool together and ride together. So, I think it's going to be a variety of different vehicles as these services get adjusted. We've already gone from the 40-foot busses to 30foot busses a number of years ago and probably 70% of our routes because that's all we need. The 40-foot busses are the ones that in the main parts of Cook County and are the routes that run a great deal and have great ridership. We're constantly looking at that and we're going to look and try to work, as I talk about zero emission, we're going to try to work with Lion Electric who is coming into Will County and also Rivian and lots of different types of busses that they can create for us and work in some of our areas.

Mr. Rocky Donahue stated obviously as we change our service to more ondemand we would definitely use smaller vehicles. We're, right now, the largest, smaller bus provider transit system in the country. We have over 2,500 pieces of equipment on the road every day. Most of those are the smaller Dial-a-Ride vehicles and in some cases it's just cars picking up individuals within the city of Chicago. To your specific question do we change our service because the post-COVID world will be different? Our equipment will be changed with the market.

Member Mitchell stated I know in the beginning not every township had Will Ride at its disposal. Just wanting to know whether or not its changing or you're expanding that?

Mr. Rick Kwasnewski stated that's really a County Board decision. We've worked over the past couple of years, numerous times over the past year, on what could happen county-wide and so forth. It's been done in McHenry and DuPage and Lake is in the process of it right now. I think you guys are looking at that and I think that's where the market study would be able to help you formulate how that could work. If you guys, do it, it will probably work very similar to the other counties, but it would be more modified to the county needs in particular. That's your call. We're partners in it.

Member Mitchell stated being a suburbanite, a lot of us would like an easier way to get to the airport. Perhaps in your imaginations you could come up with something that might be a little easier and more cost effective for those who would have to go back and forth from both airports to the suburbs, especially from this area.

Mr. Rick Kwasnewski stated it's very easy to say that we could do that, and we could, but there's some federal regulations that prevent us from doing something from downtown Joliet to O'Hare Airport. It's a violation of a federal charter act. There are protections...so, we're subsidized by the taxpayers, we can't take away private business that's regulated. There are different opportunities. We could establish a route from point A to point B, but we would have to operate that route continually throughout the year. It's a little bit of a challenge.

Mr. Rocky Donahue stated the good news is that it kind of segue's with Bus on Shoulders. Bus on Shoulders on I-55 is very successful. IDOT allowed us to expand that on to the Edens Expressway. We then worked with the tollway and expanded it on I-90 from Elgin to O'Hare. We're running right now service on I-90, it doesn't help Joliet, but from Elgin to O'Hare. Because of that we received some of the Rebuild Illinois funding. We're doing a study right now with the tollway at the Tristate. They are now widening the Tri-state and looking at running service from the south suburbs to the Oaklawn area, but sometimes it's not as easy as putting a bus route in because of a whole host of other regulations and laws we have to deal with.

Mr. Rick Kwasnewski stated we could get you close, to Rosemont, and then you could take the El.

Member Ventura stated I'd like to congratulate you guys for moving towards zero emissions by 2040. I think that's quite a feat. I would love to see a more advanced timeline but that's an excellent first start. How we structure our dollars in this budget from this year to the next 10 is really very important. I am a huge proponent of public transportation. I think this is a super beneficial service to our communities and subsidizing those dollars is important because it allows that service to be provided by our government and make sure people have access. That being said, in the past some of the pollution put a higher burden on areas with people of color including her in Joliet where I reside. CNG is still a high pollutant, although it is better than diesel. Thank you for moving away from diesel. In your presentation you have 51 to 81 CNG busses. I would encourage you guys to look at that to lower that number. Over the next 10 years an electric bus can save you up to \$400,000 from 10-12 years. You also have your paratransit

vehicles, you have 262 for the upcoming rolling stock. That is quite an increase. With the new technology and industries like Lion Electric in Will County when we buy electric vehicles from them, that increases our economic development here in our region, it provides jobs, and of course, it moves your smaller vehicles over to electric. Over to looking towards buying more electric or busses (inaudible) there is \$39.9 million in the Illinois EPA VW settlement. Some of the other transportations like METRA, etc. are going after those dollars. I think it would behoove PACE to do the same (inaudible) aggressively go after those dollars and have this budget and future budgets rely heavily on the electric side and go after those dollars as opposed to using tax dollars. The last two things I'd like to point out, too, is that (inaudible) was just passed this year. That did a lot for more incentives for electric, so I'd like to maybe see that in future budgets. And then of course we have the infrastructure bill at the federal level that hasn't passed. If it does, I would hope that we could use those incentives too since there were quite a few for electric busses. All of this is basically to say I would like you to look at the investment you have planned in this current budget for the CNG busses and some of the paratransit and make move them over to electric instead.

Mr. Rick Kwasnewski stated I think what we're trying to do is move forward as quick as we can with the routes that we know we can and that's why we started in the Waukegan garage, it serves that entire area up there. We are also working, as I said earlier, to try to figure out if we can do something with Lion Electric. We're also trying to partner with other transit agencies throughout the state that are smaller that could benefit from PACE's numbers that we would buy in the way of smaller paratransit vehicles to try to get those on the street as quick as possible. As with anything, it's a transition. It's a combination of cost, practicality and how busses would serve on different types of routes. We're going to do this as aggressively as we can. That year may change. I think the five-year projection is probably going to change. After next year when we come back, it's always revised, so it will be revised based upon are information that we get and where we're at. I'm lucky to be on the American Public Transit Association board and on the Zero Emissions Committee, so we share a lot of information from other agencies throughout the country. We're going to try to do this as quick as we can, but we've got to be able to deal with our existing service, keep it on the street and be as reliable as we can as well. We're certainly going to make every effort to do that.

Member Freeman stated good morning. Congratulations to you both for and your new upcoming roles. I would like to say that a lot of people think about PACE they think about the big busses. I love the idea of smaller vehicle options. I am excited about Lion Electric and Rivian options. Is there a plan of communicating all of these options to the public when they are finally set in place?

Mr. Rick Kwasnewski stated what do you mean a plan to communicate? What we are trying to do?

Member Freeman stated like right now you even have where they partner with people and ride in the same vehicle?

Mr. Rick Kwasnewski stated yes, we do that. Obviously, we continue to do that. It's been an ongoing program with our vanpool, to give an example. Typically, we would end up working with employers and communicating that out to their employees to get them to ride-share together. We certainly continue to do that on our website. Usually, people try to promote that at any events they go to whether it's Chamber of Commerce events or CED events or whatever the types of services that we have. We're one of the largest vanpool operators in the country. The quickest way to build it is by working with employers, but certainly we can do that with individuals who are neighbors. If they're going in the same area, we can certainly do that as well. If you've got any suggestions on a better way to communicate that information out to people, we'd love to hear it.

Member Freeman stated I had never heard before of the smaller options until today.

Mr. Rick Kwasnewski stated it's a very successful program. There's also something called Ride Share on the RTA where you can punch in your address and so fourth and it can pop up addresses near you that would be interested in using Ride Share and then we leave it up to the two individuals to go ahead and connect via an app service. I don't want to say it's free, it's whatever you work out with your neighbors. That's one option too. Ms. Beth Adams can make sure you guys get all that information in an email.

Member Moustis stated Will Ride is open to all townships or any other participants who understand it's a partnership and there is a cost that goes with that, so townships would have a cost. But what I really want to say, Mr. Rocky Donahue, it's been an absolute privilege working with you. You've been a real asset to Frankfort Township and to Will County. You will be missed. You have been an extraordinary civil servant. I wanted to thank you for your service, I hope you have a great retirement and hopefully our paths will cross another time. You've just been fantastic, and I wanted you to know that.

Mr. Rocky Donahue stated thank you for the kind words. I enjoyed our relationship as well.

Executive Bertino-Tarrant stated I'd like to thank Mr. Kwasnewski, Mr. Roger Claar and we have Ms. Elizabeth Gonzales here as well as a Community Relations representative. Mr. Rocky Donahue, I want to extend my gratitude and appreciation. Not only in my role here, but my role in the senate. You've always been somewhat easily accessible and always full of ideas and willingness to help. I really appreciate it and I wish you the very best in your retirement.

Member Marcum stated before I make a motion, just a quick explanation. I added a condition for the second item on the agenda, so after I made a motion to approve the first one, I'm going to add the same condition so they're consistent.

Member Cowan stated I received an inquiry from a constituent and Member Ogalla you might know more about this than I do, but there might be some broken tiles and the tiles need to be marked. I'm not sure if that's something that we need to address before the construction happens, if that's possible at this point, but I have a feeling Member Ogalla knows more and can speak more intelligently about this than I can. Member Marcum stated one of the conditions is an agricultural litigation agreement, and I don't know if that's covered in there, so I would defer to staff if that's something that's covered in the litigation agreement.

Mr. Brian Radner stated prior to the site being built, they hold the preconstruction meeting, and they go over all these types of things. Any field tiles that are detected and broken during the construction have to be replaced, or possibly rerouted so drainage patterns aren't disrupted. That's part of the process. It's something we have to do. We've been working closely with the Will County Farm Bureau and an agricultural specialist to make sure this activity is happening and with existing facilities that are under construction. Right now, my understanding is that whenever that has happened, it has been taken care of. These new facilities that are before you today, I'm not really sure why it would be a broken field tile already because they shouldn't be getting involved (inaudible).

Member Ogalla stated I just want to say something really quick. I did attend PZC this month because of these SUP requests and I'm on Land Use. At Land Use Committee I did make a motion to postpone these two SUPs until the ordinance could be updated because I felt that was a better way to handle it because we would have more coming forward next month. What's happened is, back when this solar farm came to Will County, we put an ordinance in place for them to follow and the state, and Executive Bertino-Tarrant probably remembers, we worked to create an ordinance they would have to follow for an agricultural mitigation agreement. Over the course of two years, we have learned that there are some issues that have come up. I hope to postpone the special use permit request until we have the ordinance update so that everyone would be working underneath the same thing. I can make amendments to them. First I'll talk about the two things I'm asking to make amendments for then I'll make the motion for the amendments. One of the things that everyone has to remember is that Land Use operates on a complaint driven basis, so these amendments will help them give them the authority to not wait until a complaint comes in but to actually be active in doing that. One is about the field tiles. One will be to have a tile expert perform tile location and flagging prior to construction. It's happened in the past where the solar panels were put on and then a tile was found and they did fix it, which was great, but we feel if we change that, then that would prevent any tiles from being broken and tiles used for drainage in the field and help prevent other fields surrounding it or a neighboring property, if it's a residential area, from being possibly flooded out. So, that's one thing, and the other one which we've had some issues with is the ground cover and maintenance. Again, it's complaint driven so people have to call in and complain. I've got pictures with weeds as tall as I am and that's unacceptable. That's why Washington Township requested that both these SUPs be denied. I'll be making a motion that we make an amendment so that the mowing will occur four times a year during the growing season. One more thing before I do that, so that the background is complete. The good news is that Land Use has hired Mr. Ross Higgins. He is a weed specialist so he can help us out with noxious weeds. Noxious weeds are an issue we had with the county and with the state, we were in violation, so he's hired now so he knows what a good weed is and a bad and a noxious weed. It's very hard to determine some of those weeds apart, so he is also on this job task now so that helps us out. I would like to make a motion to add a condition to require that the tile expert perform the tile location and flagging to the field prior to any construction of the solar farm.

Member Cowan stated can I just ask Assistant State's Attorney Tatroe, just for clarification, if we have an ordinance that...I'm just checking to see if this is actually legal?

Assistant State's Attorney Tatroe stated if you amend it specifically, if it is a condition you want for that specific property, you would have to do it now. If it's a general condition such as mowing or more of a property maintenance issue that would apply to all properties, then you can do that at any time.

Member Van Duyne stated the way I look at this amendment, it's no different than any other job preconstruction meeting that they have required JULIE such as water, electricity, fiber and so forth so I would be in support of the amendment. Thank you.

Member Ogalla stated I would like to add a second amendment right now as well. Assistant State's Attorney Tatroe addressed the fact about mowing, the problem is, the current ordinance doesn't require mowing as much as is needed, as we determined. These will be ordinance changes I put in and Member Marcum has put it on the Land Use Committee for discussion next month. Until that's changed, I will be making a motion to add these amendments now, so that they're set with these current SUPs.

Assistant State's Attorney Tatroe stated this is as a condition of the special use permit, correct?

Member Ogalla stated correct. This is for an amendment for the mowing so that we can not have weeds as tall as myself or others in the room. I would like to make a motion regarding ground cover maintenance. I would like to have it be that we will have mowing four times a year during the growing season, with the opportunity to mow two weeks for each one of these times because rain might prevent them from mowing. It would be to mow the last week of June or the first week of July. The second time would be the last week of July, the first week of August, the third time would be the last week of August and first week of September and the last one is the last week of September or the first week of October. It's kind of complicated, but if we get a week of rain...

Member Marcum stated I have something before we do that. The part that I was alluding to earlier to be consistent with the second one which actually kind of deals with what Member Ogalla was just speaking and that is the actual area the have maintained. I'll make a motion to add a condition that the operator shall maintain the area between the right-of-way and the fence line of the solar (inaudible) which is shown within the lease area.

3. 21-328 Determination of the Estimate of the Annual Aggregate Levy

Member Harris stated property taxes are about 39% of the county total revenues. This levy includes a 1.014% Consumer Price Index CPI adjustment and that includes new property in the county since last year. The 1.014% is a natural result of national inflation during this economic recovery year and the county's growth. Will County makes up 6.6% of every tax bill compared to other taxing districts. The tax rate, the Will County portion, as you know, Will County has grown. Over the last four years the county tax base has increased 4.5%. The equalizer says Will County property has increased by one billion dollars since 2020. While the county is growing, the tax obligation has been spread out across more property tax bills leading to a decreased rate. This attributes to a broken residential commercial and industrial property. The Will County tax rate has consistently decreased over the last five years. The tax rate has gone from .5986% in 2017 to .528% in 2021. We had a discussion, as we do every year, about the CPI. If we did not take the CPI, a new property adjustment will (inaudible) \$3.8 million cut in the

corporate fund and will be unable to use funds from another source to make up this amount. This happens at a time of growing public safety and building expense. Monthly impact will most likely be on our growing personnel and maintenance costs. This results in a heavy impact on growing public safety and judicial line items which make up 66% of the county operating expense for maintenance on a new and old facility which results in an increase for future expenses. As far as public safety, two-thirds of our budget is spent on public safety both sheriff and judicial operations. Forty-two percent to the sheriff and 24% on the judicial operations which goes to the Circuit Court. A \$3.8 million cover will most likely result in public safety cuts as well as impact on our personnel, and we will not be able to hire sheriff deputies, new court personnel to respond to the growing needs, assistant state's attorneys, public defenders, Circuit Court, Circuit Clerk, (inaudible) court security and no new deputy coroners. In committee, a 4/4 vote, therefore there is no recommendation from the Finance Committee.

Member Moustis stated I am not necessarily in favor of taking the levy to the maximum allowed. When the chairman of Finance Committee talks about cuts, you're not cutting anything. You're cutting growth, you're not cutting into last years' budget. It's not a matter of are you cutting, it's how much are you letting it grow. I think that should be said because I don't want the public to get the wrong idea like we're actually cutting something. We would not be. We're just not growing it as quickly if we don't approve this maximum amount allowed for the levy. I'm a "no."

Member Ogalla stated no matter what board I would sit on, I don't ever support taxing to the max. Living in Illinois, we hear about our constituents always saying about our property taxes being so high. I do understand the fact that Will County's portion is low compared to other portions in the state. Hopefully the state would actually get together and make a good plan for providing more tax dollars to the school system so that our local taxes could go down. That's my opinion on this. Thank you.

Member Balich stated the other day in our caucus we talked about the budget. One of the things that bothered me about it, besides going to the max, I think it's a time we should be cutting tax dollars, which is more important than cutting percentages, because everybody's assessment is going to go up because all the people from Chicago want to get away from that garbage and come out to Will County. Now, all of our homes went up in value, so now people that don't make so much money lately are going to have to pay more money in taxes because we're going by a rate. In my township, we're going to cut it by dollars, not by rates. That's just one reason I don't like it. The other thing is, we have all the money from the American Recovery Act and there is a revenue, this is what I'm hearing at caucus and maybe I'm wrong, there's nothing showing the expense going up. You have money coming in, but you don't have an expense going out. It looks like you have a lot more money than you have. Unless I can get it clarified, that's what I think is happening. It's not transparent to say you've got \$1 million coming in and nowhere to spend it. I don't know if I said it right, but that's kind of what I'm hearing.

Member Mueller stated I just want to correct a couple of things on the record. The school districts in Illinois are the highest part of your property tax bills go to. If you're interested in talking with your state representatives about evidencebased funding that was passed in the state recently to help deal with some of those problems, that would be your next step in that. I also want to point out that while I appreciate not cutting anything, I also want to be careful that we are providing the best possible services that we can to the residents of the county here. This is a discussion that we have every year that I've been on the Board, that some folks don't want to increase the levys or take the full levy and things like that. I just also want to remind folks that Will County's tax rate has significantly decreased over the last five years due to the growth of the county. A lot of these things factor in and I'm going to be in support of this. Thank you.

Member Weigel stated I'm not in favor of taking the CPI. Our property taxes continue to grow every year and I think governmental bodies should restrain from taking CPI, so I'm going to be voting against that. Thank you.

Member Fricilone stated in the budget presentation we were told that the budget is down \$16 million and yet we're raising taxes. I don't understand it. I'm voting "no."

Member Berkowicz stated I just want to say that I don't support this because when you talk to your constituents, and we're homeowners as well, we pay our property taxes. I have not seen my property taxes decrease from any entity. Member Mueller mentioned the School Board; our particular taxes increased \$200 for the school district. Listening to the difficulty that our neighbors are having...everything is the cost of insurance, the cost of gas, the cost of food. Everybody is asking the question, "How are we going to continue to handle this?" For that reason we have to consider that when we vote for a tax increase. The people who are paying for that tax increase are businesses and our residents and they're struggling right now. I think that's the conversation we need to be having. Thank you.

Member Cowan stated to clarify, the Special Meeting for number six and number seven will be a full Board meeting. It will be publicly posted as all of our meetings are. The goal would be to have the map that we would be voting on publicly posted at the time of that meeting. The Board members and the public will have a chance to examine that map, and as in all of our meetings, discuss and provide comment and feedback. During that vote, as dictated by statute, we will also have to set the salary for members of the Will County Board. Since we have postponed number six, I would like to make a motion to postpone number seven, 21-355, Setting Salaries for members of the Will County Board.

Member Moustis stated this is a question for Assistant State's Attorney Tatroe. We didn't have a discussion about this yesterday at the Republican caucus, (inaudible) I was told that's not the way we have done it in the past. It was pointed out to me that 10 years ago, it was one resolution for the map and salary. They weren't separate resolutions. Perhaps that's how we have to do it procedurally according to state statute. I'm just wondering, is it one resolution or is it two separate resolutions? I was told it has to be one resolution. So, we are procedurally correct going in to the Special County Board meeting.

Assistant State's Attorney Tatroe stated the statute says that you do have to decide both at the same time. It says that you shall set the manner of compensation and set their salaries at the same time. It's not clear what that means. I will check to see if there's any caselaw, I don't think that there is. I know it was done with one resolution last year but I would prefer for my own comfort level to look into it a little more closely to make sure we get it right. I know 10 years ago you did it with one resolution. How it was done 20 or 30 years ago, I don't know. We could also reach out to other counties and see how other counties have done it as well. I will do some research into it.

Member Mitchell stated I don't understand why we can't have a discussion now. I understand why we probably don't want to do the map now because we are still working it out, but we could at least open the discussion about the County Board members' salaries. I don't see a problem with that. Is there anything legally excluding us from doing that?

Executive Bertino-Tarrant stated there's not a resolution right now that we're posting, so there's no discussion. When it goes back to the full Board, you'll be able to discuss it when you're actually voting on it.

Member Fricilone stated when are we going to discuss salaries? The map is a map, but the salaries...are we just going to discuss it five minutes before we vote on it? Is there a proposal out there on it from the other side who is obviously driving this? I'd like to see something so we can talk about it and calculate it.

Member Berkowicz stated I would like to ask a question and I was told it wasn't the time, we couldn't have a discussion, and then we took a vote, and then my question was answered. I find it very confusing why we couldn't just answer my question before the vote, but we had to wait until the vote and then the question was answered and that was regarding the meeting. Now we are talking about setting salaries. From what I'm hearing, we're not supposed to talk about that today. We are supposed to postpone that. Is that correct? My point is salaries were discussed at significant length at the last Executive Committee meeting where cost-of-living was brought up. There were several statements that some of our commissioners believe that it's time for a cost-of-living increase for elected officials. So, it's already been discussed, and it's already been brought up. Just wondering why right now, today, we're being told it's not the right time?

Executive Bertino-Tarrant stated there's nothing for us to vote on and discuss right now. It's going back. You don't even have the information. All we're going to hear right now is comments that aren't even real...you don't have anything to look at to discuss. In general conversations, and this is what you want to do in committee, they allow everyone to speak in committee. We don't have a proposal to even discuss. It's not on the agenda yet, so I'm not really sure what you are going to be discussing. I am going to move on with this meeting.

Member Pretzel stated there obviously seems to be some confusion even amongst ourselves. I imagine people from the public have tuned in because it's on the agenda. I don't understand what it is we're waiting for to have that discussion.

Executive Bertino-Tarrant stated right now they're still in negotiations with the map, so we are still unclear whether we have to put them together or separate. Right now, it's not really clear if we have to do them together or separate. The past practice is that we did them together.

Member Ventura stated this is clarifying our process moving forward. I know we've talked about this before. When I said there was discussion, I want to read exactly what it is discussion is limited to: Postponement is debatable, but permissible debate is restricted to pros and cons of the postponement and to what the question should be postponed. Debate may not go into the merits of the main motion. So, to answer Member Berkowicz's question, we can talk about whether you agree with postponing or not. We are not allowed to talk about is the thing we are trying to postpone, until that vote has been taken. If at that point it's postponed, we cannot have any further discussion about that item. If it is not postponed, we would go right into discussion of the item. To clarify, yes, you can have discussion about postponing, but not about the item you're trying to postpone. Back to tabling, that is conditional. So, there's no discussion about it because it would rely on something physically happening or not happening. You would need to discuss it because it's an (inaudible) then. I hope that clarifies that.

Member Fricilone stated to the postponement, when we've voted on salaries every two years, that recommendation has always come out of Executive Committee. If we're not going to have an Executive Committee before we have the Special Meeting, then how are we going to postpone it after the Special Meeting and then do it at the same time, potentially, as the map vote? I'm getting confused on timetables here.

Member Cowan stated procedurally we don't need an Executive Committee meeting to put something on the agenda for the Special Meeting. I will take full

personal responsibility for not starting the conversation about salaries earlier. I was so focused on the map and the discussions about that. Frankly, it really wasn't on my radar. It's an honest mistake and we will be able to have a full and open conversation about it. If the Republican caucus wants to bring forward a proposal, they are more than welcome to. They've had caucus meetings; they are welcome to do that. Thank you.

Member Coleman stated I'm new so I'm really asking questions honestly because I do not honestly understand. Last month when we had our meeting it was, we didn't have enough information to discuss it. I just don't understand why we can't open the discussion and if we have to discuss it further at a different meeting and a different time, we should be able to do that. I just don't think we should postpone this discussion.

Member Berkowicz stated my question about the Special Meeting, and Member Ventura my question was about the Special Meeting not the item on the agenda. At the Special Meeting, I am assuming we'll have the information that we don't have today and haven't had in the past. Is it the intent that at that Special Meeting this Board is supposed to see the information we're finely given, absorb it, discuss it, and pass it in one meeting? Is this the path? We've had months and months and months of talking about this and pushing it forward. We had a great committee and we've thrown all that aside. Is that it? This Special Meeting, is it? That's what I'm hearing.

Member Cowan stated again, just to repeat, any one of our 26 members or one caucus or another is absolutely entitled to bring forward a proposal. We have no proposal as Executive Bertino-Tarrant has pointed out. No proposal on the agenda right now so there's literally nothing on the agenda to debate for and against. That is how parliamentary procedure works. You have an agenda item that you debate for and against. I would encourage individual members or either caucus to bring forward a proposal about setting the salaries.

Member Moustis stated I just want to say I'm opposed to any increases for County Board members. For those of you who say, "There hasn't been an increase for 12 years," it doesn't pertain to almost any of you. I think there is an attempt to oppress discussion on this from the very beginning.

Member Ventura stated to the postponement, I hear what you're saying. I, too, have asked questions about when we are having this discussion. I will be voting "yes" for the postponement, but I would like to see, before anything is put on any other medium or any other agenda on this, some information from HR. I'd like to ask Mr. Bruce Tidwell to provide us with the information of how much our benefits are, how much our healthcare is, how much our salaries are, what the savings is on the proposal for people being cut. I think that is data we are all deserving of and we can make sound decisions on that data once it's given to us.

To the point there is nothing here, we have not been given that data. I like to see that we can have a fair discussion about salaries. In the press, media has asked about the last time any increases were and there was some discussion what the dates were. So, if we can also get that information.

Executive Bertino-Tarrant stated for our new members here, I do not make the agenda. You have to speak to the Speaker. My job is to follow the agenda. Regarding postponements or amendments, this is all done by you, the voting body. My role is just to follow parliament procedure as best as possible and to maintain order in here. We are postponing this. Are there anymore comments on the postponement?

Member Kraulidis stated my point is that I hope that we get this information in advance in a timely manner so we can make an educated decision.

Member Moustis stated I'm opposed to postponing because I believe we should have further discussion before postponement.

After examining the maps for both Plan 13 and Plan 11, I strongly believe that Plan 13 should be the approved plan (over that of Plan 11) for the following reasons:

1. 55 ILCS 5/2-3003(1)(b) states that the county districts "...shall be comprised of contiguous territory, as nearly compact as practicable."

The current board district districts are all contiguous, however, 4 districts are not very "compact" (Districts 3, 9, 10, 13). Plan 13 proposed districts are all contiguous and are significantly more compact than that of the current board configuration and that of Plan 11. Plan 11 proposed districts are all contiguous (barely) (Districts 5 and 11 are contiguous only by a thread and District 3 has a nearly isolated/non-contiguous island out in the middle of District 1). Furthermore, Plan 11 proposed districts are NOT compact (especially Districts 5, 9, 10, and 11), nor as compact as Plan 13. The accuracy/truthfulness of the County Executive Redistricting Principles for Plan 11 are now questionable because #4 is not true ("4. *Each of the Districts*

contained in the County Executive Reapportionment Proposal of 2021 was drawn to be compact and contiguous, as required by the Illinois Constitution.")

I believe Plan 11 violates the intent of the apportionment statute significantly more than Plan 13 and gives a much stronger impression of political boundary gerrymandering.

Not only does Illinois law (55 ILCS 5/2) proscribe compactness of political boundaries, the US Supreme Court (*Shaw v. Reno*, 509 U.S. 630, 1993 and *Miller v. Johnson*, 515 U.S. 900, 1995) affirmed the principle of geographical compactness, in particular, over that of racial/ethnic compactness.

2. 55 ILCS 5/2-3003(1)(d) states that the county districts "...shall be created in such a manner so that no precinct shall be divided between 2 or more districts, insofar as is practicable."

The current board district apportionment has only 3 precincts that are split into 2 or more districts. By my count, Plan 13 has 29 precincts that would be split into 2 or more county districts. And by my count, Plan 11 has 38 precincts that would be split into 2 or more county districts. Plan 11 violates the intent of the apportionment statute significantly more than Plan 13 and will cause increased confusion at the precinct polling places and require additional different ballots for those affected precincts. This also adds to the impression that political boundary gerrymandering is occurring





Budget Highlights

The 2022 Pace Suburban Service budget is balanced to available funding. Several service enhancements are incorporated into the 2022 budget described below:


- Public funding for Pace Suburban Service increases by 14.7% as compared to the 2021 estimate. Sales tax receipts have recovered from the losses experienced due to the coronavirus pandemic and Pace will use federal coronavirus relief funding assistance to offset a shortfall in combined sales tax and operating revenue.
- The 2022 budget is balanced to the RTA funding level with no fare increases. This is achieved through the use of federal coronavirus relief funding. The recovery ratio requirement remains at 30.30%. Pace will use federal relief funding and RTA-allowed credits to raise its base recovery rate from 11.32% to meet the recovery ratio requirement.
- · Service reductions were implemented in 2020 in server to algorithms were implemented in 2020 in response to significant ridership losses as a result of the pandemic. Due to an ongoing nationwide shortage of bus operators, Pace has restored service on only a small number of these routes in 2021 but plans additional reinstatements in 2022, which will also see the implementation of Dempster Pulse arterial rapid transit service. Additionally, Pace plans to partner with transportation network companies (TNCs) in 2022 to expand service options for riders.
- Pace projects to finish 2021 \$12.7 million unfavorable due to lower than normal farebox revenue and the continued effect of the coronavirus pandemic on ridership. Pace will use federal coronavirus relief funding to make up this shortfall.
- The 2022 Suburban Service Capital Program totals \$56.9 million, primarily for rolling stock and support facilities and equipment. The budget includes a \$10.0 million electric bus pilot program at the North Division garage in Waukegan,



2022 Proposed Suburban Service Operating Budget

Operating income generated by fares and local support, advertising revenue, and interest comprise 11.3% of total revenue for Pace. Public funding, primarily from RTA sales tax and matching state contributions (PTF), provides 69.1% of Pace's operating budget, with federal coronavirus relief funding and federal discretionary fund programs making up the remaining 19.6%.

Uses of Funds (000s) - Total \$272,579



The 2022 operating budget is balanced to available funding. The majority of the budget is spent on the provision of services by Pace operating divisions and their central support services (fuel, insurance, supplies, etc.). Pace also funds municipal fixed route and demand response services, private contract services, and vanpool services.

Ordinance Amending the Will County, Illinois Zoning Ordinance Adopted and Approved September 9, 1947 as Amended for Zoning Case ZC-21-037, Chanemcoco LLC, Owner of Record, (Charlotte Alyce Andres, 100% Beneficiary) Keri Williams, GreenbergFarrow, Justin Hardt, Borrego Solar System, Inc., Agents, Requesting (S-21-011) Special Use Permit for a Major Public Utility, a Solar Farm Facility, for PIN #22-23-100-001-0000, in Washington Township, Commonly Known as Vacant Property on E. Indiana Avenue, Beecher, IL, County Board District #1

WHEREAS, the Planning and Zoning Commission of Will County, Illinois has recommended the reclassification of a certain area within the County as hereinafter described; and

WHEREAS, such recommendation was based upon a duly publicized hearing by said Planning and Zoning Commission of Will County affecting property located in <u>Washington</u> <u>Township</u> where such area is situated; and

WHEREAS, due notice of the time and place of such hearing was published in a paper of general circulation in Will County, Illinois; and that report thereof has been made to this Board within thirty days after such hearing.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED, by the County Board of Will County, Illinois:

<u>Section 1.</u> That the "Will County Zoning Ordinance", approved September 9, 1947, as amended, is and the same is hereby amended by reclassifying the area described as follows:

Special Use Permit for a Major Public Utility, a Solar Farm Facility with Fifteen (15) Conditions

- Upon fourteen (14) days of written notice to the owner of record and/or operator at their last known address, Will County Land Use Department and Will County Sheriff's Department employees are hereby granted the right of entry in and upon the premises for the purpose of inspecting the premises and uses thereon for compliance with the terms and conditions of this special use permit.
- 2. The applicant must comply with all requirements of the Will County Division of Transportation and the Beecher Fire Protection District. Approval will be required as part of the building permit and/or site development permit application.
- 3. Ground mounted solar energy systems shall not exceed 25 feet at maximum tilt.
- 4. Perennial vegetative groundcover must be established and maintained in all areas containing solar arrays and in required setbacks to prevent erosion and manage run-off. The seeding mix details, reseeding plan and timeline, weed management practices, and mowing schedule shall be completed by an Agricultural Specialist or Agricultural Consultant and included in the landscape

plan. A landscape plan shall be submitted at time of site development permit and/or building permit application(s) for Land Use Department approval.

- 5. Along the northern boundary of the project site, a landscaped area at least ten (10) feet in width with at least one (1) shrub per five (5) linear feet, plus at least one (1) evergreen tree per twenty-five (25) linear feet of perimeter area must be provided. Shrubs must be at least three (3) feet in height at time of planting. Evergreen trees must be at least five (5) feet in height at time of planting. A landscape plan, that includes weed management practices, shall be submitted at the time of site development permit and/or building permit application(s) for Land Use Development approval.
- 6. Along the southern and western boundaries of the project site, a landscaped area at least ten (10) feet in width with at least one (1) shrub per five (5) linear feet, plus at least one (1) evergreen tree per twenty-five (25) linear feet of perimeter area must be provided. Shrubs must be at least three (3) feet in height at time of planting. Evergreen trees must be at least five (5) feet in height at time of planting. A landscape plan, that includes weed management practices, shall be submitted at the time of site development permit and/or building permit application(s) for Land Use Development approval.
- 7. Top soils shall not be removed from the site during development.
- 8. Outdoor lighting is prohibited except for that which is required by code.
- 9. On-site power lines and utility connections will be allowed above ground if required by the electrical utility provider.
- 10. Any solar farm that has not produced energy for a continuous period of one (1) year or more must be decommissioned in accordance with the Decommissioning Plan currently on file with the Will County Land Use Department, with updated costs.
- 11. The owner and/or operator shall execute an Agricultural Impact Mitigation Agreement (AIMA) with the Illinois Department of Agriculture. The owner and/or operator shall submit a copy of the signed Agricultural Impact Mitigation Agreement (AIMA) at the time of building permit and/or site development permit application. Financial assurance shall be provided to the County in accordance with the AIMA.
- 12. Prior to submission of a site development and/or building permit application by the owner/operator, a pre-construction meeting shall be held. The agencies/individuals invited to attend shall include Will County staff, elected officials, Will County Farm Bureau staff, and other interested parties as determined by Land Use staff and/or the owner/operator.
- 13. The owner/operator shall retain an agricultural specialist or agricultural consultant to serve as part of the development and/or construction team. The agricultural special use or agricultural consultant shall be retained prior to submission of the site development and/or building permit application.
- 14. The owner and/or operator shall submit a copy of the decommissioning plan to all property owners(s) within the boundaries of the special use permit area. The property owner(s) shall sign affidavits acknowledging receipt of the

decommissioning plan and their respective responsibility for decommissioning costs. These affidavits shall be submitted to the Zoning Administrator at the time of building permit and/or site development permit application.

- 15. Prior to issuance of a site development and/or building permit, the owner and/or operator shall submit a completed Interconnection Agreement.
- 16. The operator shall maintain the area between the right-of-way and fence line of the solar array, approximately the northern 112 feet by 585 feet, which is shown to be within the lease area.
 - 17. The owner/operator shall be required to submit a drain tile map as part of the building and/or site development permitting process. Any drain tiles existing on site shall be identified and marked on site prior to any construction of the solar farm. The owner/applicant is held to the requirements of section 155-9.245(L)(3) of the Will County Zoning Ordinance.
 - 18. Mowing shall occur four times a year during each growing season on the following schedule: end of June/start of July, end of July/start of August, end of August/start of September, and end of September/start of October.

Staff presented report with the explanation of the suggested 15 conditions which from past solar farms, conditions # 4, 5, 6 and 12 have been enhanced to have further concentration on the landscape and maintenance of the solar farms.

Of the Agencies notified. Washington Township Board objected to this request. Objection letter attached to the report files.

Representative on behalf of District 1, County Board Judy Ogalla, was present and spoke with concerns. Major concern was the maintenance of the properties of the existing solar farms throughout Will County, in particular, District 1 area. When these solar farms were first presented the plan looked like a good plan. Now a few years existing; they look a mess, unsightly for the county. Ogalla stated she intends to discuss with the Land Use Committee and County Board to change the Zoning Ordinance in regards to the solar farms maintenance; i.e.; trees, shrubs, fencing regulations.

Agents from Borrego Solar Farm were present. Kip Smith stated the major goal for the solar farms is energy. He stated he could not comment on the existing farms within the county as this is their first request. Borrego solar farms have successful technology. They are unique as they do not take over or remove the farm land. They remain on the land and has not had any negative impact to the ground. They have currently 15 solar farm sites in Illinois. The one in Kankakee County exists and he suggested it be viewed by Mrs. Ogalla. They have outlined landscape plan of 5-10 feet outside the fence line with a 100' buffer. They concur with all the conditions and will abide by them. The tall vegetation is not effective for the solar farm either. Causing mechanical

problems. Mr. Smith stated he looks forward to hearing Mrs. Oglala's' ideas and will work along with suggestions.

Staff recommended approval of the special use permit for major utility/solar farm facility with the 15 conditions:

- 1. Upon fourteen (14) days of written notice to the owner of record and/or operator at their last known address, Will County Land Use Department and Will County Sheriff's Department employees are hereby granted the right of entry in and upon the premises for the purpose of inspecting the premises and uses thereon for compliance with the terms and conditions of this special use permit.
- 2. The applicant must comply with all requirements of the Will County Division of Transportation and the Beecher Fire Protection District. Approval will be required as part of the building permit and/or site development permit application.
- 3. Ground mounted solar energy systems shall not exceed 25 feet at maximum tilt.
- 4. Perennial vegetative groundcover must be established and maintained in all areas containing solar arrays and in required setbacks to prevent erosion and manage runoff. The seeding mix details, reseeding plan and timeline, weed management practices, and mowing schedule shall be completed by an Agricultural Specialist or Agricultural Consultant and included in the landscape plan. A landscape plan shall be submitted at time of site development permit and/or building permit application(s) for Land Use Department approval.
- 5. Along the northern boundary of the project site, a landscaped area at least ten (10) feet in width with at least one (1) shrub per five (5) linear feet, plus at least one (1) evergreen tree per twenty-five (25) linear feet of perimeter area must be provided. Shrubs must be at least three (3) feet in height at time of planting. Evergreen trees must be at least five (5) feet in height at time of planting. A landscape plan, that includes weed management practices, shall be submitted at the time of site development permit and/or building permit application(s) for Land Use Development approval.

Along the southern and western boundaries of the project site, a landscaped area at least ten (10) feet in width with at least one (1) shrub per five (5) linear feet, plus at least one (1) evergreen tree per twenty-five (25) linear feet of perimeter area must be provided. Shrubs must be at least three (3) feet in height at time of planting. Evergreen trees must be at least five (5) feet in height at time of planting. - 8. Outdoor lighting is prohibited except for that which is required by code.
- 9. On-site power lines and utility connections will be allowed above ground if required by the electrical utility provider.
- **10.** Any solar farm that has not produced energy for a continuous period of one (1) year or more must be decommissioned in accordance with the Decommissioning Plan currently on file with the Will County Land Use Department, with updated costs.

- 11. The owner and/or operator shall execute an Agricultural Impact Mitigation Agreement (AIMA) with the Illinois Department of Agriculture. The owner and/or operator shall submit a copy of the signed Agricultural Impact Mitigation Agreement (AIMA) at the time of building permit and/or site development permit application. Financial assurance shall be provided to the County in accordance with the AIMA.
- 12. Prior to submission of a site development and/or building permit application by the owner/operator, a pre-construction meeting shall be held. The agencies/individuals invited to attend shall include Will County staff, elected officials, Will County Farm Bureau staff, and other interested parties as determined by Land Use staff and/or the owner/operator.
- 13. The owner/operator shall retain an agricultural specialist or agricultural consultant to serve as part of the development and/or construction team. The agricultural special use or agricultural consultant shall be retained prior to submission of the site development and/or building permit application.
- 14. The owner and/or operator shall submit a copy of the decommissioning plan to all property owners(s) within the boundaries of the special use permit area. The property owner(s) shall sign affidavits acknowledging receipt of the decommissioning plan and their respective responsibility for decommissioning costs. These affidavits shall be submitted to the Zoning Administrator at the time of building permit and/or site development permit application.
- 15. Prior to issuance of a site development and/or building permit, the owner and/or operator shall submit a completed Interconnection Agreement.

Planning and Zoning Commission voted 6-1 to approve the special use permit for a major utility/solar farm facility with the 15 conditions.

ORDINANCE OF THE COUNTY BOARD WILL COUNTY, ILLINOIS

Prohibiting the Use of Groundwater as a Potable Water Supply by the Installation or Use of Potable Water Supply Wells or by Any Other Method Within the Specified Limits Surrounding the Property at 1306 McKinley Avenue, Joliet, IL, County Board District #8

WHEREAS, certain properties in the County of Will, Illinois have been used over a period of time for commercial/industrial purposes; and

WHEREAS, because of said historical uses in proximity to the Property at 1306 McKinley Avenue, concentrations of certain chemical constituents in the groundwater beneath the County may exceed Class I groundwater quality standards for potable resource groundwater as set forth in 35 Illinois Administrative Code 620 or Tier I remediation objectives as set forth in 35 Illinois Administrative Code 742; and

WHEREAS, the owner/operator of the Property at 1306 McKinley Avenue is seeking issuance of a No Further Remediation Letter ("NFR Letter") from the Illinois Environmental Protection Agency ("IEPA") pursuant to the IEPA's Site Remediation Program; and

WHEREAS, in order to obtain an NFR Letter for the Property at 1306 McKinley Avenue, the IEPA has advised that it will be necessary for the County of Will to pass an ordinance as provided for in Title 35, Part 742.1015 of the Illinois Administrative Code, commonly referred to as an "institutional control," prohibiting the use, or attempt to use as a potable water supply, groundwater from within that portion of the corporate limits of the County of Will described herein as Exhibit A and illustrated in Exhibit B; and

WHEREAS, the County of Will desires to limit potential threats to human health from groundwater contamination while facilitating the redevelopment and productive use of properties that are the source of said chemical constituents;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the County Board of Will County, Illinois as follows:

Section One. Recitals Incorporated.

The foregoing Recitals are substantive and are incorporated in this Section 1 as though fully set forth.

Section Two. Use of Groundwater as a Potable Water Supply Prohibited.

Notwithstanding anything to the contrary contained in the County of Will Code of Ordinances, except for such uses or methods in existence before the effective date of this Ordinance, the use or attempt to use, as a potable water supply (any water used in human or domestic consumption including, but not limited to, water used for drinking, bathing, swimming, washing dishes or preparing foods),

groundwater from within the specified limits described in Exhibit A, and as illustrated on the attached ordinance map (Exhibit B) by the installation or drilling of wells or by any other method is hereby prohibited, including points of withdrawal by the County of Will.

Limits: All tax parcels as specified in Exhibit A.

Section Three. Penalties.

Any person or entity violating the provisions of this Ordinance shall be subject to a fine of not less than \$100.00 nor more than \$500.00 [for each violation, and each day a violation continues shall constitute a separate offense].

Section Four. Repealer.

All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict with this Ordinance are hereby repealed insofar as they are in conflict with this Ordinance.

Section Five. Severability.

If any provision of this Ordinance or its application to any person or entity or under any circumstances is adjudged invalid, such adjudication shall not affect the validity of the Ordinance as a whole or of any portion not adjudged invalid.

ORDINANCE OF THE COUNTY BOARD WILL COUNTY, ILLINOIS

Amending Solid Waste Disposal Ordinance, Title 5, CH. 50, §50.43, to Increase Clean Construction and Demolition Debris Fees Based on Amendments to the IL Environmental Protection Act

WHEREAS, the Illinois Environmental Protection Act, 415 ILCS 5/22.51b(f), authorizes local governments with certain delegation agreements with the Illinois EPA to collect fees from Clean Construction and Demolition Debris (CCDD) Operators for accepting clean construction or demolition debris or uncontaminated soil at CCDD fill operations; and

WHEREAS, Will County and the Illinois Environmental Protection Agency first entered into a Delegation Agreement on October 6, 1988, and on May 20, 2021, the County Board approved Resolution #21-172, Extension of the Delegation Agreement until June 30, 2026; and

WHEREAS, Will County's Solid Waste Disposal Ordinance, Title 5, Ch. 50, §50.43, currently provides for the collection of CCDD fees; and

WHEREAS, Public Act 102-0271, effective January 1, 2022, authorizes the following increases in those fees: (1) increase from 10 cents to 20 cents per cubic yard of clean construction or demolition debris or uncontaminated soil accepted by the clean construction or demolition debris fill operation; and (2) increase from 7 cents to 14 cents per ton of clean construction or demolition debris or uncontaminated soil if the CCDD owner or operator weighs the material with a certified device; and

WHEREAS, the Resource, Recovery & Energy Division of the Land Use Department recommends amending the County's Solid Waste Disposal Ordinance to increase the usage fees consistent with the legislative amendments to 415 ILCS 5/22.51b(f); and

WHEREAS, the Executive Committee concurs with the recommendation.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED, that § 50.43(C)(1) of the Solid Waste Disposal Ordinance is amended as follows to increase the CCDD fees consistent with the amendments to the Illinois Environmental Protection Act, effective January 1, 2022:

(C) Amount of fee to be paid.

(1) Fees established under this subchapter shall be \$0.20 per cubic yard of clean construction or demolition debris or uncontaminated soil accepted by the clean construction or demolition debris fill operation, unless the owner or operator weights the quantity of the clean construction or demolition debris or uncontaminated soil with a device for which certification has been obtained under the Weights and Measures Act, in which case the fee shall be \$0.14 per ton of clean construction or demolition debris or uncontaminated soil.

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED, that the Preamble of this Ordinance is hereby adopted as if fully set forth herein. This Ordinance shall be in full force and effect upon its passage and

approval as provided by law.
