Member Ventura stated I would like to point out that there's a letter by the diner that is just north of there detailing some problems they had there. I understand there were some concrete blocks that blocked their building when the Will County inspectors went out there. Those blocks were stacked behind the building, so at that time there was nothing for the inspectors to see. My objection to this doesn't have anything to do with the business owner. I think they should have the right to have their storage facility. My concern, as many of you know, is that we continue to approve these into I-1 because we have no other category for this super, light industrial, so we're forced to make it I-1. The long-term planning of our county allows for these to later become warehouses or other light industrial facilities. Even though that is not what this business owner is requesting, they have no other option but to request that because we have no other category. I would offer to postpone this so that we can create an accurate category for properties like this. We've seen many of these in the last three years, but I understand that some people want to move this forward. If it does more forward, I will be a "no" vote on this. I think it is our responsibility, as Board members, to consider the long-term growth of our county. Zoning allows us to help direct where things are being built in our county, such as residential, commercial, and industrial. When we don't take that into consideration and we just willy-nilly approve these because we want businesses to have their business, then we have long-term unintended consequences like having warehouse rows on roads that we didn't anticipate that happening. By voting for this, we set precedence for other

land in this corridor to become warehouses. It is on a state route, it is on a truck route, it is foolish for us to think that if we continue to vote some of these into I-1 then it wouldn't become a place for warehouses to want to be. Because of that, I would encourage us to postpone this, create the correct category, allow this business to thrive under that new category, and safeguard all the residents. There are homes right behind this and all around this. We really need to just be better stewards. Thank you.

Member Traynere stated I agree with some of Member Ventura's comments, but I want to bring to your attention, and I don't know if it matters, but in the narrative on this it says, map amendment from C-1 and R-4 to "I and." I think it should say I-1, it just says, "I." I don't know if that matters but I just wanted to point it out.

Member Brooks stated this is in District 9, I currently represent District 8, this is not in my district, however, I do disagree with my colleague in District 9 in that I don't believe that we ought to punish the current business owner while waiting for a change. As you well know, and everybody in Land Use knows changes in those zones can take quite a while. I think that what is presented here in the category that's a four to two, Mr. Thompson for his business. This is the best thing we have right now. I don't think we ought to postpone, I would encourage everyone to vote yes on this project. Thank you.

Member Ventura stated my understanding is the applicant only wants to postpone it because we don't have a full Board here. I understand there's a legal objection and we need 20 votes to pass it. It is also my understanding that there was no Board member that was going to vote "no" for it anyway, so if that's indeed the case, then I don't understand why we are tabling it. If that's not the case, I would just ask that any Board members who need more time say so, and we can postpone it. But if we're really going to vote on this no matter if it's today or next month, I don't see the point of waiting 30 days if we can just go ahead and help the applicant now. Especially in the fact we just read the Proclamation for Fair Housing Month, then that would indeed include housing for people who need services like this.

Member Brooks stated the owner has made that request and whatever his reasons are, he needs to go back and talk to his attorneys, and he had asked that request, Member Weigel, to pull it off right now and give him a little. That was his request, so I would be in support of removing it.

Member Balich stated just because some people don't show up doesn't mean you don't vote if you don't have a quorum. I find that absurd. If we table it, that's fine because the gentleman wants it, but at the same time we shouldn't even be talking about tabling something because we don't have certain people here, that's stupid.

XIV. LAND USE & DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE RESOLUTIONS

Member Balich stated I don't like the idea of sprinklers, and everyone knows it. There's a lot of reasons for it and I don't want to get into an argument, but this is about getting the Fire Department stuff that they can get automatically by FOIA. So why do we make them FOIA when we should just give it to them?

Executive Bertino-Tarrant stated that is what this agreement does.

Member Berkowicz stated I realize staff came forward and said that this would create (inaudible) some of the burden of them by providing some of the information which would be provided to them. I had a question about the length of time. I recall that there was a concern about the length of time for the agreement. I know it's probably right in front of me, but was that reduced?

Member Weigel stated the committee changed it from 20 years to a 10 year agreement.

Member Moustis stated this was a matter of discussion a number of years ago, and it really had to do with the county enforcing various fire protection district ordinances which were different. The County Board at the time felt we could only enforce our ordinance. We did ask that the fire departments of Will County come up with an ordinance that they all could adopt and perhaps we could support, so that's a little bit of a concern of mine. How does this work? Are we going to deny building permits based on fire protection district ordinances? Or, is a fire protection district (inaudible) or are they going to have to do separate enforcement to stop the building permit or the building? I'm wondering how this is going to work. It would be easier if they had a common ordinance throughout fire department agencies that we could enforce or adopt. I'm concerned how this is going to work. Fire departments that have various different ordinances, how they're going to enforce this, and will that stop us from issuing a building permit? It has to be more than them saying to us, "Well, we're not going to allow it."

Assistant State's Attorney Tatroe stated I am going to look to Land Use for the discussion that took place between Land Use and the fire protection district. Legally, the county has no obligation to enforce the fire protection district's ordinances.

Mr. Brian Radner stated good morning. This will not stop the department from issuing a building permit. This will allow the fire district to have access to the information that they obtain through FOIA, like they do every couple of weeks right now. So instead of submitting a FOIA request, they'll get an autogenerated report that's going to show all the building permits for single family residential homes, and get that data they can get through FOIA. There is no private information that will be given through this data sharing agreement. If the district objects to the home that's being constructed, they're going to have to enforce their own regulations, but the county can still issue a building permit under their codes.

Member Berkowicz stated so this will apply to unincorporated development as well as incorporated within New Lenox. Is that correct?

Mr. Brian Radner stated this will only apply to the unincorporated areas. This agreement is for what the county has jurisdiction over, the Land Use Department, which is unincorporated areas of the fire protections district's boundaries.

Member Berkowicz stated but they have the ability to have unincorporated development comply with their district? Is that correct?

Mr. Brian Radner stated it is correct that the fire district does have that ability for the unincorporated areas. This is New Lenox Fire Protection District. Their boundaries do include municipalities in New Lenox and maybe Mokena and maybe one other. It also includes all the unincorporated areas. This agreement is only for new homes constructed in the unincorporated area.

Member Berkowicz stated are there any other fire districts that have these types of requirements and these restrictions?

Mr. Brian Radner stated there are two other districts in Will County. Manhattan Protection District and I believe Elwood, but I would have to verify that. They're not the only one that has it.

Member Fritz stated I agree with Member Balich that in general requiring sprinklers and the higher level of scrutiny that the New Lenox Fire Protection District requires for new construction is really excessive. I generally will vote for property owners' rights, but I think in this case it behooves a property owner to be aware of the regulations where they're building, and perhaps they will realize they should probably build their house someplace else and it would be less expensive because of the excessive regulations. So, in a way, I think it is protection for the property owner to be aware of all the requirements and (inaudible).

XXI. EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE - M. COWAN, CHAIR

22-92 - Motion to end Discussion

Member Gould stated I would like to offer an amendment with respect to resolution 22-92. In the language about "This award is for 75% Green Block and Index Price, etc." My motion is to amend that to delete 75% and insert 50% there.

Member Ventura stated we had a lot of discussion during Executive Committee and the compromise was that we came to 75%, and I would ask that we vote "no" on Member Gould's motion to move it to 50% and keep it at 75%. Our nuclear plants were bailed out by our state to the tune of \$800 million, so they're not closing any time soon. All of this is still under Exelon, they still get their contract regardless. By buying (inaudible) it allows other entities when our government invests in renewable energy, it allows other entities to do the same by lowering that price in the future. This also ensures that we are moving towards renewable energy, so we all have a planet to live on. I think Will County should stay at the 75% to send that message that we care about all of our residents, but we also care about keeping those jobs too. Seventy-five percent is a fair compromise, and I would hope that everyone here will vote "no" on the motion and "yes" on 75%. Thank you.

Member Moustis stated I would still like a clarification. If we went to 50%, we're talking about 50% nuclear energy, or what they call brown energy, which is carbon free, so it is a form of clean energy, even though not renewable energy. You can talk about subsidies, but there's no industry in the entire country that is more subsidized than the green energy industry. Hundreds of millions, most likely, when you consider all the tax breaks that get involved. So, let's not talk about who is getting subsidized here. For clarification, we would be going from 75% renewable green energy and 25% nuclear energy. Certainly, we have a nuclear plant here with well over 1,000 jobs, good, well-paying jobs and I believe our biggest taxpayer in the entire county...the real estate taxes. So, then we would be going 50% renewable green and 50% nuclear/brown energy. Is that correct? Is that what that amendment will do?

Member Gould as I've said many times, I have Braidwood units one and two in my district. As Member Moustis stated, there are about 1,000 employees, and that doesn't count all the economic impact when they have a turnaround, which brings in tradesman from all over northern Illinois to work in this plant. Many of my constituents are employed there and if you take a ride around the district and even parts of Will and Grundy County, you see the signs in people's yards that say, "Save our nuclear plants." These people are very concerned. This is how they support their families and they're very concerned about the health of the nuclear industry. I'm very sensitive to their concerns. I think that we should embark upon the strategy that says if we're going to buy locally, if we're going to purchase in this county and then those dollars are reinvested in Will County. We know that

this is a large economic engine in the county, and nuclear power is important. I might mention that just two days ago, the Biden Administration reiterated the importance of nuclear power to our economy. The Secretary of Energy Granholm said, "We are using every tool available to get this country powered by clean energy by 2035. That includes prioritizing existing nuclear fleet for continued emissions-free electricity generated, and the economic stability for the communities leading this important work." It sounds like the federal government is on board with keeping nuclear power and they recognize the importance that nuclear power has to the communities. That was stated by Secretary Granholm just two days ago. For those reasons I am going to recommend that we approve this amendment.

Member Mueller stated I want to clarify a point Member Moustis made regarding green energy versus clean energy and nuclear, and whatever else. I was hoping that maybe someone from our energy department could clarify what brown energy is so that folks understand...I want to understand that further before I vote on the amendment.

Ms. Christina Snitko stated good morning, everyone. For the basis of this agreement, for this term, brown energy does include nuclear. Green energy, renewable energy, would be wind or solar, or a different renewable energy source. For the purposes of this agreement, nuclear would fall under brown energy...coal, natural gas.

Member Balich stated when you talk about green energy, it's kind of a farce what we're told about that. In Europe, they're getting oil from Russia now because they know it doesn't work with the green energy because in the wintertime, like in Texas last year, people were freezing to death because the energy didn't work. Then you talk about to make that energy. How many gallons of diesel does it take for a bulldozer or any kind of machine to dig in the earth to pull out the batteries, the lithium? How much does it cost for that? How many square miles of Earth is destroyed just to get the stuff to make a battery? And then after you make the battery, there's no way to dispose of it. You can't throw them in the landfill. From what I've been reading, there's all kinds of Tesla cars that the battery costs more than the cars are worth now. Beautiful cars sitting there with no battery. You can go on and on about the windmills. You can't put the propellers in a landfill. When you talk about green, I think it's absurd. You've got natural gas, which is clean, but they don't want to talk about that. It works all winter, and nothing freezes up. You also have nuclear. Other countries have nuclear. We just make it so it's almost impossible to get a nuclear plant built now with all the regulations. If we could eliminate some of the regulations, maybe we would have more energy and it would be cheaper. This is a big problem here that one side is saying stuff that isn't true. There are all kinds of fallacies being said about green energy. Therefore, I am with Member Gould 100%. In caucus I said we should go to 0%, but I'm compromising and going to 50% because I'm a fair guy.

Member Mitchell stated I'm having a problem with the qualification. If it were another contract, it would be green energy, but for this, it's going to be called brown energy. That's what it sounds like what you're saying.

Ms. Christina Snitko stated I want to be very careful when using terms and definitions because they vary state-by-state, they vary by jurisdiction, they vary by companies. So for the purpose of this agreement, I will say that nuclear energy falls under brown.

Member Mitchell stated I rest my case. Thank you.

Member Traynere stated I just want to read from the <u>U.S.A. Today</u>: "Wind turbine blades can be recycled now though the practice is not widespread. Wind turbine blades have been typically constructed to last 20-25 years. This means many blades that are being decommissioned now remain a couple of decades ago. At that time, they weren't designed with recycling in mind, but the new blades that are going up are." So, there's a lot more that are going up currently than were put up 25 years ago. I think we'll be fine with the recycling.

Member Berkowicz stated a lot of good points here today, but I do support the amendment for the 50% because we also have a responsibility to our taxpayers. We would pay significantly more for the 75% versus the 50%. For that reason, I feel it is reasonable and we are promoting green energy at the 50% level, but we're also respecting our taxpayers, the people who work hard and live in this county who need these extra dollars to maintain their livelihood. I do support the amendment and I think that's one conversation we have not been having. It's the people who are paying our taxes and this is a substantial cost. I feel the 50% is the most reasonable option we have.

Member Newquist stated I have two questions. If we stayed with the 75%, does Will County itself have enough green energy to satisfy that 75% requirement, or would it have to go outside the county? My second question is, I haven't seen any figures comparing the cost of electricity at 50% to 75%. If you guys could just touch on that briefly...thank you.

Ms. Christina Snitko stated to speak on your first point, the renewable sourcing is going to be elsewhere. It can come from Will County, but you can't measure exactly 25% is coming from Will County and 50% is coming elsewhere. It's the nearest and what is the most readily available, so I don't feel comfortable answering to that extent. As for the prices, we do have them here. If we go with the 50% green block index offer for 48 months, the total projected annual per year, which is estimated, would be \$1,866,604.90. That's for the four-year term. For the 75%, it would be for the same term \$1,903,945.25, roughly.

Member Newquist stated so we're talking about \$100,000 difference over the four years?

Ms. Christina Snitko stated yes.

Executive Bertino-Tarrant stated right now we are voting on whether to stop further discussion on this and we'll take the vote after.

22-110 - Motion to Amend to send back to Finance Committee

Member Fricilone stated since all we can do is get in line to order vehicles right now, you can't actually take possession of anything, I suggest we move this back to Finance Committee so they can find an appropriate place in the budget for next year, which is probably when we're going to get them. We can look at it then. The agencies can go ahead and put an order in, because with all state contracts, there is a non-funding agreement that if in fact a vehicle becomes available, and the government agency doesn't have the money, or doesn't fund it, then they don't have to pay for it, and someone else will grab that car anyway. So, they can go ahead and get in line and place an order, but there's no point in us funding it now, out of contingency, because they're not going to get these cars until next year anyway, which will be next year's budget. I suggest we move this back to Finance Committee.

Member Ventura stated I'm fine moving it back to Finance, but when it does go back, there were two quotes provided. Some of them were hybrid and some of them were for regular. I understand there's a long waiting list for both, so if they could please discuss both of those at Finance so it is clear for this Board which one of those contracts will be moving forward. Thank you.

Member Brooks stated although I do concur with Member Fricilone's recommendation, I have a son in the car business, and he told me unless you sign up now, it might take a year. I concur, but I think what I'm being told is that unless you put that order in now...

Member Fricilone stated you don't have to put any money down; you just have to place an order under the state contract. We don't pay until we get the vehicle which will be in next year's budget.

Member Mueller stated it is my understanding that these departments are desperately in need of these vehicles so I'm struggling with delaying anything. I guess my problem is, if we send this back to Finance, how much is this delaying them getting their cars? I understand they won't get them until next year, but there's a big difference in next year January and next year December because we talked about it for a really long time and they're in need of these vehicles. So, I want to make sure I am not delaying them in receiving these vehicles, even if it's going to be next year. Assistant State's Attorney Tatroe stated just a suggestion because I think it's difficult for department heads to go forward with a purchase without knowing where the funding is coming from. At the very least I would suggest the County Board authorize the purchase but send it back to Finance for how the financing would take place.

Member Ventura stated the motion for permission to purchase...again, are we purchasing a hybrid or are they purchasing a non-hybrid?

Assistant State's Attorney Tatroe stated the decision on what kind of vehicle should be purchased should be for the elected officials. It should be in their discretion based on the needs of their office. It shouldn't be regulated by County Board as to what vehicle they purchase.

Member Ventura stated there were two quotes that came forward. What is the Coroner asking for?

Executive Bertino-Tarrant stated let's call Coroner Laurie Summers down to the podium.

Member Ventura stated we received two quotes for one of the vehicles. One is a hybrid and the other one is the same vehicle that's not a hybrid.

Coroner Summers stated I think there was a difference in the pricing. I think the hybrid would take longer is my understanding of it. All of these vehicles that we are talking about are sitting about 1,000 feet from my house. There's about 3,000 at the racetrack waiting for that chip to come in.

Member Ventura stated my understanding is that we have to vote, approve the purchase and send it back to Finance, but I will not be voting yes on a vehicle that's not a hybrid. Do you know which one you asked for?

Coroner Summers stated I asked for the regular vehicle.

XXIV. COMMENTS BY COUNTY BOARD MEMBERS

Member Parker stated I just want to say thank you to Speaker Cowan for all her efforts with the Ukrainian aid effort, Member Berkowicz and Member Ventura and anyone else who participated. Twenty pallets were collected, and they were all shipped to Poland. I do have a letter here, but I can't quite pull it up. It's from the Ukrainian church expressing their thanks. Thank you.
Member Mitchell stated I just want to say a couple of things. We received a very lovely letter from a gentleman whose mother was being cared for at Sunny Hill Nursing Home. All of our public health community members, it's just a testament to how wonderful Sunny Hill is. I just want to give a shout out to Sunny Hill and the staff and everybody. Also, I want to apologize for my outburst against my fellow County Board member, Member Traynere, and to you, Executive Bertino-Tarrant. I'm sorry about that. The next thing I wanted to mention is, it was brought to me several times and I tried to avoid it and I really didn't want to talk about it, but I guess you can use this as a teachable moment. I'm going to read my statement, so I can stay on track. I hesitated to speak on this issue because I am in a very unique position of being both a racial minority and a racist, just by virtue of being a Republican, apparently. I am neither a poor soul to be protected by my betters, nor am I a totem to display whenever such an accusation arises. I am speaking up because there is a bigger issue at stake here. I would like to say I'm surprised, but unfortunately, I can't say that because the political discourse the last two decades has made the ignorant, intolerant, and the vitriolic into violent people. When will it end? It ends when we, as leaders, stand up and say that we will no longer participate in the demonization of people with whom we do not agree. This is not just a party versus party issue, this is an intraparty issue, this is an interfamily issue, interfaith issue. The failure is not in having an event, an offending venue where people have said some nasty things. The failure is in not having enough humanity to recognize intolerance for everyone. It is intolerable. So, tolerance is even for things with whom or for people you do not agree. Let's try to practice it and let's be better. Thank you.

Member Coleman stated I wanted to speak on two things. I am in all county business. What I mean by that is that I live in district 10, but I work across the county. I grew up in district eight and have significant friends and family in district nine. When the proposal to move from commercial to residential for this rehab center was brought up, I immediately thought "no" because the east side of Joliet is barren to many luxuries and privileges that I have where I currently live. So, I think it's extremely important that we're addressing the opioid epidemic, and now it's become a public health issue. It's not similar to a previous epidemic where it was more about police and prison. I'm still for helping people so perhaps the expertise of the (inaudible) can be used by our Health Department who already has programs in place for the opioid crisis. I just think whenever we get to that boat, I'm not voting to change it to residential. If you think about where you live and where you want to live, and I'm not discounting any human being that may have had some problems. I've had family members that have had addiction issues, and so on, but what I'm saying is we have our whole Health Department and we're talking about possibly 12 individuals and it could be some type of collaboration there and that would be my suggestion for that situation. With that said, the demographics of opioid overdoses and addictions are middle-aged and higher, and we're ignoring where it may start, which is in your younger ages. The Health Department had a program called the "Yes" program. This is one of the things I think should be fasttracked. The Yes program through the Health Department was primarily in the Joliet schools but now they're wanting to expand throughout the county. It provides mental

health experts which creates jobs for others that come in and helps students across the county where students are now high school students facing a lot of different challenges. COVID-19 just heightened it. I'm just asking that we pay more attention to proactive measures such as this program and fast-tracking that through getting funding. There was a wonderful Executive Committee meeting last week that displayed how we are going to possibly spend some of the dollars. I think we should focus in on that area. Finally, back to the property on Chicago Street, there was a proposal that is a commercial property...there are some other individuals who own property that want to create jobs and businesses and companies that will be a positive impact in that area. I drive on Rt. 53 all the time, Laraway School is in that area, there's a community center in that area and it's very dangerous when crossing over when you want to turn into the neighborhood. Thank you.

Member Pretzel stated I filled up my car with gas yesterday and when I pulled up to the pump, I saw that the car before me had put in \$5.00 worth of gas and I looked down and it was just under 1.2 gallons of gas. Maybe enough for them to get to work and back. The County Board approved resolution 19-359 on December 19, 2019 that imposed a tax as defined in the motor fuel tax law upon all persons in Will County engaged in the business of selling motor fuel at retail for the operation of motor vehicles on public highways or for operation of recreational watercraft upon waterways etc. at four cents per gallon. Gas was in the two's then and it's in the mid-four's now and occasionally goes up to close to \$5.00 per gallon. This has a negative impact on the lowest income residents in Will County, on small businesses in Will County... it affects them the greatest. I think it's sad that the resolution that I put forth won't even be assigned to a committee so we can have an open discussion about it. I get it, we're not all going to agree on it. It passed back in 2019, and obviously there's enough support for it to pass then, maybe our resolution wouldn't go anywhere. I do think it should be assigned to a committee so we can have it go on an agenda so we can discuss it. I think this is sad. The cost of living right now is on everybody's mind. The cost of gas is impacting our lowest income residents the most, and I really encourage you all to speak up to leadership so we can get this assigned to some sort of an agenda, so at least we can have a discussion. Thank you.

Member Ventura stated for the zoning project that was discussed, this is for housing. This is not just for addiction services. Our Health Department does not provide housing for individuals to transition back into our full society. These halfway houses are crucial for them to get their needs to be met in order for them to move away from their addiction and back into a working society. I would encourage every member to have a discussion with Ms. Kathleen Burke about the needs of housing in our county, especially when it comes to substance and behavioral abuse. We have some time before the next vote, so I would just encourage everyone to speak with her. As for the energy contract vote, this was not about where we get our electrons. We mostly receive them through the nuclear plants. We know this and have talked about this in other meetings. This vote was about investing our taxpayer dollars and encouraging green energy, which is renewable as opposed to the fossil fuel industry. Yes, the nuclear plants are included in the fossil fuel brown energy category, but the false rhetoric of jobs lost in Braidwood is just an excuse to keep investing in the fossil fuel industry. This is not about where the energy comes from, this is not about jobs, this is not about Braidwood. This is about the financial future investments in our planet, in our children, and transitioning those living wage jobs to green jobs of the future which also pay a prevailing wage. I would hope that the climate crisis would be the priority for all of us. It is a priority for my family and my constituents, and I ask that you consider your role in protecting our planet and future. Thank you.

Lastly, I just wanted to take a minute to thank everyone for their support this month. Announcements by County Board Minority Leader, Mike Fricilone

Speaker Fricilone stated as always, I want to thank my caucus for all their hard work and the full County Board. Another shout out to National County Government Month. We all know here that county government is where the rubber meets the road. We see that when we attend NACo or read about things that are happening at NACo. Really, county government is what runs this country. This next comment is a little self-serving. This Saturday, April 23, is National Take a Chance Day and National Lover's Day. Forty-five years ago my wife took a chance, we got married...the lucky lady that she is, as am I, so I thought at least once in my term of ten years here I would mention my wife, Barb.

Announcements by County Board Speaker, Mimi Cowan

Speaker Cowan stated first of all I wanted to make sure that, I think all of our Board members are aware now, we have a full County Board staff, once again. I am thrilled and I am sure that Mr. Nick Palmer, Ms. Beth Adams and Ms. Sandy Ceci are even more thrilled than I am. Almost two weeks ago we welcomed Ms. Pam Dantzler, who is our new administrative assistant, and a week or two before

that we welcomed Marcie, who is going to be on our finance team, and Cassandra who is in communications. If you haven't met them, say "hi", we're really happy to have them. I'm on my mission to remind everyone, if you get county health insurance, don't get the surcharge, get the extra \$200, get your points, get your biometric screening. I did also want to take a moment to address what Member Mitchell brought up. I agree, this is a teachable moment. One of the lessons for me is to not believe everything you see on social media. If you see something about one of your colleagues on social media, maybe ask them about it before you share or make public comments about it. I want to be very clear about what that post said. It's a political thing, but I think I want to address it in this forum for a variety of reasons. An account called Indivisible Naperville posted something that said, "Hope you can join us for our All Republicans are Racist event. Contact Mimi if you have any questions." It gave my personal cell phone number. There are a few things I want you to know about this post. First and foremost, neither I, nor Wheatland Township Democrats are hosting or involved with any event called "All Republicans are Racist." I would not be. I have not said that, and I would not say that. I do not believe all Republicans are racist. If that's true, then you might be wondering why Indivisible Naperville might have posted that. The reality is, whomever is posting under the name Indivisible Naperville is not, in fact, in any way affiliated with the actual group Indivisible Naperville. The leaders and members of that group have been trying for months to determine who runs that Instagram account. They have failed to do so and they have tried to get the account shut down. That has also failed. They have now started legal action to get the account shut down. One of the co-chairs of Indivisible Naperville was here earlier today. She had to leave to speak about that and they are issuing their own press release. This is not the first time this account has sought to create divisiveness or sow seeds of chaos and hostility. It is the first time the account has posted someone's private information on a post. For that reason, we were able to get the post taken down. It violated Instagram's community standards by posting my cell phone number. It's pretty clear that posting my personal cell phone number was intended to encourage offended readers to harass me directly. While the post was removed by Instagram for violating the community's standards, it was first screen-shoted and shared by a number of people. Some of those posts remain active on FaceBook and Twitter and Instagram. To those of you in this room who saw this post and called me to talk about it before sharing it, I appreciate you doing that. It really means a lot to me. I appreciate being given the chance to address you about this. It's my opinion that this post was intended to do damage not just to me, and Indivisible Naperville, but also to this Board. I work on an almost daily basis with Member Fricilone, and I've got to tell you, and some of my friends are not going to like this, but I like this guy. I know it's trite to say, but Member Fricilone and I agree about more things than we disagree about. Make no mistake, sometimes we strongly disagree about things, but I actually think Member Fricilone and I work together really well. I would never in a million years say that Member Fricilone is a racist because I don't believe he is. But, if Member Fricilone saw this post and believed it, you bet that would damage our

working relationship. How could it not? That's what I think the real intent of this post was; not to make Member Fricilone in particular hate me, but to make all of you upset with me, to make all of us upset with each other, and that's what really pisses me off. We have a lot of great things going on in this county. We have a chance to allocate \$134 million. We're building a renewable natural gas plant that will provide revenue for decades to come to our county. We have one of the most celebrated and awarded forest preserves in the state and we have a fabulous bond rating, because of years of Republicans and Democrats working together to make sensible fiscal decisions. Whoever runs this Instagram account and decided to attribute those words to me and post my personal cell phone on social media certainly has it out for me. It's sad and frustrating and have wasted a lot of time these last few days dealing with this. I normally wouldn't discuss political matters at a Board meeting, but I know this impacts how we relate to each other and work together, so I wanted to make sure my fellow Board members heard me today. I do not think all Republicans are racist. I have disagreed with probably every elected official in this room at one point or another and it doesn't have a lot to do with party. I've argued with Member Moustis, I've argued with Member Ventura, everyone loves it when I argue with Executive Bertino-Tarrant. But I actually believe in every single one of you, as well. I believe that everyone here wants to focus on the work of running county government and making it as efficient and prosperous for our residents as possible. We sometimes have really different ideas about how the best way is to do that, but I am not going to let some internet troll who won't even own their own lies to keep me from working with each and every one of you. If you have questions about my beliefs, call me, ask me. If what I've said is unclear in any way I'll be happy to repeat it. I am sorry there are people out there willing to spread lies about us because we're elected officials. It truly is unfortunate for each and every one of us.

Authorizing the Sale of Surplus Real Property Acquired by Condemnation

WHEREAS, the County of Will (the "County") has undertaken a series of eminent domain proceedings against certain properties along the east side of Bell Road north of 143rd Street in Homer Township to widen and resurface County Highway 16 (commonly known as Bell Road) at its intersection with County Highway 37 (commonly known as 143rd Street), in Will County, Illinois, in order to facilitate the free flow of traffic and ensure safety to the motoring public (the "Bell Road Project"); and

WHEREAS, as a result of the final disposition of eminent domain case number 18 ED 03 for Parcel No. 0011 of the Bell Road Project, which required a complete taking, the County acquired a certain parcel of real property (the "subject property") that was not needed for the Project (*i.e.* an odd lot remnant not needed for the widening and resurfacing); and

WHEREAS, the said subject property is presently vacant, unimproved and not profitable to the County, resulting in ongoing liability and maintenance responsibility, the County having no present use for the subject property and no foreseeable future use for the subject property, which for these reasons continued ownership of the subject property is considered not in the best interest of the County and the same is hereby declared surplus property; and

WHEREAS, the subject property is more specifically listed and described on the attached Exhibit A, including details such as size, use, and zoning; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to paragraph 2 of 55 ILCS 5/5-1005, the County of Will has the power to sell and convey or lease any real or personal estate owned by the County; and

WHEREAS, Section 10-5-105 of the Illinois Code of Civil Procedure (735 ILCS 30/10-5-105) authorizes the County to sell surplus real estate in accordance with certain statutory procedures as set forth therein; and

WHEREAS, the County has been presented with an opportunity to dispose of the subject property in the form of a proposal for a land swap, in which the County would transfer fee simple title of the subject property to the Defendant in eminent domain case number 16 ED 42, in exchange for conveyance to the County by the Defendant of a fee simple title to a strip of property along Bell Road (Parcel 0012) plus a temporary easement (Parcel 0012TE) needed by the County for the Bell Road Project; and

WHEREAS, said land swap, together with other consideration not set forth herein, would be made as a means of settlement of eminent domain case number 16 ED 42; and

WHEREAS, the value of the subject property to be offered for sale has been determined to be the amount of **\$200,000.00** by a written appraisal prepared by a State-certified and State-licensed real estate appraiser, dated March 24, 2022, a copy of which has been made available for public inspection at the administrative offices of the Will County Division of Transportation;

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and

WHEREAS, paragraph (e) of Section 10-5-105 of the Illinois Code of Civil Procedure authorizes the County to accept any contract proposal determined to be in the best interest of the County by a vote of two-thirds of the members of the Board then holding office, but in no event at a price less than 80% of the appraised value; and

WHEREAS, even though the proposed sale of the subject property would result in receipt of no monetary consideration by the County, the monetized value and other benefits that inure to the County for final settlement of case number 16 ED 42 between the County and the Defendant far exceed 80% of the property's appraised value of \$200,000.00, which is \$160,000.00; and

WHEREAS, the monetized value to the County and other benefits of the sale are specifically detailed as follows:

(a) The subject property is an "odd lot" remainder parcel that increases the County's liability and maintenance responsibilities, and can be difficult for the County to dispose of;

(b) The subject property is adjacent to the Defendant's commercial use lot in case number 16 ED 42, which contains a retail strip mall. The County's taking will eliminate a significant amount of Defendant's parking spaces. Without a settlement of case number 16 ED 42, the County could very well be required to make a complete taking of parcel 0012; the real estate is valued (December 2017 appraisal) by the County at \$1,250,000.00, and the County could have to pay relocation costs for any business that leases space in the strip mall at the time of the complete taking (total of 8 commercial leasehold units);

(c) Construction costs for the Bell Road improvement project are estimated to be \$19,000,000.00. Without a settlement of case number 16 ED 42, the case would likely go to a jury trial in twelve months or more, resulting in a delay to the next construction season. If consumer inflation remains at the 2021 level of 7.9%, the increase in construction cost associated with the delay could add over 1.5 million dollars to the cost of the project.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, as follows:

1. All recitals set forth above are incorporated herein and are made a part hereof, the same constituting the factual basis and reciting the legal authorization for this Resolution.

2. The proposed sale is in the best interest of the County, and the monetized value and other benefits of the contract proposal for the sale of the subject property are deemed well in excess of 80% of the appraised value of the subject property.

3. The Will County Division of Transportation is hereby authorized and directed to publish in a newspaper published in the County at the first opportunity following passage of this Resolution, a notice of the County's proposal to sell the property.

4. The County Executive, Clerk, and State's Attorney's Office are hereby authorized and
directed to draft, execute, attest and complete any and all contracts, deeds, documents or other instruments deemed necessary or convenient to effectuate the intent of this Resolution, whether or not such other documents or instruments are attached hereto.

5. The Will County Director of Transportation, or any officers, employees, or agents of the Will County Division of Transportation as he may direct, shall take all actions reasonably required or necessary to carry out and give effect to the intent of this Resolution and otherwise to consummate the sale of the subject property to the Defendant in eminent domain case number 16 ED 42, as herein described, and take all actions necessary in conformity therewith including, without limitation, the execution and delivery of all documents required to be delivered in connection therewith.

WHEREAS, the other vendors contacted by the Will County Animal Control Department estimated that delivery and installation would take at least 12-14 weeks for one vendor and five months for the other vendor due to supply chain shortages; and

WHEREAS, the Will County Animal Control Administrator approved the proposal from Snyder Manufacturing, for all needed parts and installation in the amount of \$51,580.34, and Snyder Manufacturing, Inc., will begin work on May 23, 2022; and

WHEREAS, there are sufficient funds within the Animal Control budget to pay for these expenditures; and

WHEREAS, the Executive Committee concurs with the determination that an emergency procurement of services was required to add kennel space at the Will County Animal Control building.

(a) Any appointed board of trustees of a fire protection district may provide for the establishment of a 5member board of trustees by adopting an ordinance to that effect. An appointed board of trustees shall also be increased to a 5-member board upon the adoption of a proposition to increase the board as provided in subsection (b) of this to a 5-member board upon the adoption of a proposition to increase the board as provided in subsection (b) of this Section. When such an ordinance or proposition has been adopted, the appropriate appointing authority shall, within 60 days of the date of the adoption of the ordinance or proposition, appoint 2 additional trustees to the board of trustees, one to hold office for 2 years and one to hold office for 3 years from the first Monday of May next after their appointment and until their successors are appointed and have qualified. The lengths of the terms of these 2 additional members shall be determined by lot at the first meeting of the board of trustees held after the 2 additional members take office. The 3 trustees already holding office in the district shall continue to hold office for the remainder of their respective terms. Thereafter, on or before the second Monday in April of each year the appropriate appointing authority shall appoint one trustees or 2 trustees, as shall be necessary to maintain a 5-member board of trustees, whose terms shall be for 3 years commencing the first Monday in May of the year in which they are respectively appointed.

VACANCY:

Sec. 5. [...] Whenever a vacancy in the board of trustees occurs, either by death, resignation, refusal to qualify, ceasing to be an inhabitant of the district, or for any other reason, the vacancy shall be filled as follows: (i) if the vacancy is in a 3-member, 5-member, or 7-member appointed board, by the appropriate appointing authority, [...] The person appointed shall qualify for office as provided in this Act and shall thereupon assume the duties of the office for the unexpired term to which the person was appointed, [...]

Sec. 6. Board of trustees; powers. (c) A member of the board of trustees of a fire protection district may be compensated as follows: in a district having fewer than 4 full time paid firemen, a sum not to exceed \$1,000 per annum; in a district having more than 3 but less than 10 full time paid firemen, a sum not to exceed \$1,500 per annum; in a district having either 10 or more full time paid firemen, a sum not to exceed \$2,000 per annum. In addition, fire districts that operate an ambulance service pursuant to authorization by referendum, as provided in Section 22, may pay trustees an additional annual compensation not to exceed 50% of the amount otherwise authorized herein. The additional compensation shall be an administrative expense of the ambulance service and shall be paid from revenues raised by the ambulance tax levy. In addition, any trustee of a fire protection district who completes a training program on fire protection district administration approved by the Office of the anisotratic variation approved by the original teventee and the protection district administration approved by the Office of the State Fire Marshal may receive additional compensation above the compensation otherwise provided in this Section. The additional compensation shall be equal to 50% of such other compensation. In order to continue to receive the additional compensation, the trustee must attend annual training approved by the Office of the State Fire Marshal on a continuing basis thereafter.

COUNTY CODE / BOARD OF HEALTH (55 ILCS 5/5-25012) PURPOSE:

Enforce and observe state laws pertaining to preservation to health. Appoint professional employees, per specific qualifications required.

MEMBERS & TERM LENGTH:

Sec. 5-25012[...]The county health department in a county having a population of 200,000 or more may, if the county board, by resolution, so provides, be managed by a board of health consisting of 12 members appointed by the president or chairman of the county board, with the approval of the county board, for a 3 year term, [...]and shall continue until

reappointment or until a successor is appointed. [...]The term of office of original appointed. [...]The term of office of original appointees shall begin on July 1 following their appointment, and the term of all members shall continue until their successors are appointed. All members shall serve without compensation but may be reimbursed for actual necessary expenses incurred in the performance of their duties. At least 2 members of each county beard of bealth of all of the purgicipation of the performance of their duties. At least 2 members of each county board of health shall be physicians licensed in Illinois to practice medicine in all of its branches and at least one member shall be a dentist licensed in Illinois. [...]In counties with a population over 500,000, two members shall be chosen from the county board or the board of county commissioners as the case may be. [...]Whenever possible, at least one member shall have experience in the field of mental health. All members shall be chosen for their special fitness for membership on the board

[...]All members of a board established under this Section must be residents of the county, except that a member who is required to be a physician, dentist, or nurse may reside outside the county if no physician, dentist, or nurse, as applicable, who resides in the county is willing and able to serve.

VACANCY:

Sec. 5 -25012 [...]and shall continue until reappointment or until a successor is appointed. [...]Vacancies shall be filled as in the case of appointment for a full term.

COMPENSATION:

Sec. 5 -25012[...]The county board in counties with a population of more than 100,000 but less than 3,000,000 inhabitants and contiguous to any county with a metropolitan area with more than 1,000,000 inhabitants, may establish compensation for the board of health, as remuneration for their services as members of the board of health. Monthly compensation shall not exceed \$200 except in the case of the president of the board of health whose monthly compensation shall not exceed \$400. **Will County Board of Health is not compensated at this time**
